RESUMPTION OF FAMOUS BLUE NOSE TRAIN SERVICE

JULY 6th, 1925

The Dominion Atlantic Railway announces that the "Blue Nose" train service, between Halifax and Yarmouth through the Land of Evangeline will be inaugurated on Monday, July 6th, and continue until the end of September.

The "Blue Nose" leaving Halifax at 9.05 a. m. daily, will connect at Yarmouth for Boston via the Boston and Yarmouth steamers. The train will be composed of a Pullman, a baggage car and 88 "Northland" and at Yarmouth will connect for St. John, N. B., Montreal and Western Point.

Passengers leaving Boston at 2.00 p. m. (Daylight Saving Time) will connect at Yarmouth with the "Blue Nose" train and arrive at Halifax at 4.25 p. m. next day.

Leaving Montreal at 12.45 via Canadian Pacific Railway, will connect at Saint John with the S. S. "Empress" next morning and reach Halifax via the "Blue Nose" train at 4.25 p. m.

Observation buffet-parlor cars will be attached to "Blue Nose" trains between Halifax and Yarmouth.

No baggage will be checked on Blue Nose trains 123 and 124.

OBITUARY

Mrs. John Stevens
Very suddenly on June 17th, 1925, from hemorrhage of the brain, Mrs. John Stevens, was called upon to lay down her home duties and enter into eternal rest, just at the noon hour, and the noon tide of life.

Mrs. Stevens was the only daughter of the late Benjamin and Jane Hambley, of Cornwall, England. She, with her parents and four brothers, came to Canada in 1871, and settled near Sherbrook. She united with the Methodist Church in 1875 of which she was a faithful and willing worker as teacher in the S. S. and being of a musical family, she with her father and three brothers, sang in the choir until in 1893, she was joined in holy wedlock to Alfred Hansford, another of England's sons, and came to Torbrook Mines, where she has fought life's battles faithfully until God called her home.

She was ever loyal to the Church she loved, and as God had prospered, gave not grudgingly to its support and taught her children to give also. She was twice married. By her first union there was born to them six sons and one daughter. In 1913 her oldest son, Percy, was killed in a railway accident in the West and brought home for burial.

In 1941, when the great war was declared, three of her sons and patriotic sons, namely, Edwin and Albert, then of Winnipeg, and Cecil at home, were among the first to enlist, to face the foe night for our country's freedom. Two were seriously wounded, Edwin and Albert, one proving fatal, and is now resting in his mother's country, while we think of Albert as one of our heroes: "Greater love hath no man."

In 1909 she was again married to John Stevens of Newfoundland, and to them have been born two sons, Walter and Scriver, one daughter, Winifred, in addition to the above mentioned, she is survived by her husband, two sons, Ralph, Windsor, Ont., Frank, one daughter, Isabel and two brothers, Messrs Richard and John Hambley of Cootesquit, Que. All the surviving children and brother, Richard, came to attend the funeral, which was held on the 22nd inst. A former pastor, Rev. J. Hockin, Middleton, spoke very comforting words from Psalm 41:1, special music was rendered by the choir. The floral tributes were many and beautiful. The embalmed body was laid to rest where loving hands had lined the grave and covered the mound with evergreen in the home cemetery behind her loved one who had gone before.

Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family.
