accuracy	ak'kū-ra-si	Precision which results from care; freedom from mistakes.
achievement	a-chēv'ment	The act of accomplishing; an exploit or great deed.
acoustic	a-kous'tik	Pertaining to the sense or organs of hearing, or the science of sounds.
acquiescence	ak-kwi-es'ens	The act of giving quiet assent.
