

maker. Mr. Redfern was educated at Brewer's School, London, and then served an apprenticeship of seven years in his father's establishment to the business of watch and chronometer making. On June 9th, 1862, he left England on the steamer Tynemont for British Columbia, via Cape Horn, and arrived at Victoria on the 17th of September. Shortly after his arrival he went into the jewellery business in Victoria and has continued at it since that time with unvarying success. In 1864 he paid a visit to the Leach river mines. In 1875 he purchased the business of Mr. J. L. Jungermann which had been established in 1858. In 1877 and 1878 he was a member of the City Council as representative for James' Bay ward, and in 1883 he was elected to the position of Mayor of the city. He has never been a candidate for political honors but has taken an interest both in Provincial and Dominion matters. In Provincial politics he is a supporter of the Robson Government and in those of the Dominion he is an Independent. He is a member of the British Columbia Pioneer Society of which he was president in 1886. He has been a member of the St. George's Society since its inception and at present time occupies the position of president. In religion Mr. Redfern is an Episcopalian and an attendant of St. John's Church. He was married in 1877 to Eliza Arden Robinson, daughter of Rev. W. A. Robinson, a native of Ireland and at the present time resident in the Orange Free State, South Africa.

Redgrave, Stephen, (Donald), was born at the small town of Crick, near Rugby, in Northamptonshire, England, and is the son of Thomas Redgrave, esq., of the same place. His father's family, the Redgraves of Crick, rank amongst the oldest and most respected country gentry in the county, having lived in the same place for many hundreds of years. Mr. Redgrave being the youngest of ten sons, his parents educated him at home, employing private tutors for that purpose, among whom may be mentioned the late celebrated Drs. Arnold and Tait. At the completion of his education, Mr. Redgrave studied law in Birmingham. In 1849, Mr. Redgrave was united in marriage to Martha Susan, eldest daughter of Benjamin Lincoln, esq., of Hendon, Middlesex, and of the firm of Lincoln & Lincoln, hatters, Sackville street, London, England, and niece of Robert Cocks, of New Bond street, printer and publisher
