

Upper Canada who have suffered by the war, & to make them
 such compensation as they may upon enquiry appear to
 merit. Lord Dufferin however cannot hold out to them any
 expectation of their receiving from Government the payment
 of the money due to them by the United States that being a
 transaction with which His Majesty's Government have no
 concern. His Majesty's Government see every reason to approve
 the plan you have recommended for the Settlement on Lake
 Huron of the Wyandots, Delawares, & the other Indian Nations now
 living in the vicinity of Canada, & so soon as the Members who
 are likely to avail themselves of this Settlement shall be ascer-
 tained a proportionate allotment of Land in that quarter shall
 be made under the same terms & conditions as that now propos-
 ed by the five Nations on the Grand River. The Government of
 Upper Canada will be directed to furnish their issues of Stores, &
 Presents to the Indian Nations to two deliveries in the course
 of the year, the one in April & the other in September, unless
 any extraordinary circumstances should render a deviation from
 this Rule absolutely necessary.
