Each family will receive a portion of land to cultivate.

A Farmer may be engaged to instruct the Indians, and agricultural implements may be purchased for their use. The accounts of the expenditure of the Establishment will be transmitted monthly to me, for the approval of the S<sup>t</sup>. Governor.

As soon as the Indians can be drawn out of the influence of the Traders the better. When the Village is built, the children will be carefully instructed, and persons qualified to take charge of their education will be attached to the Establishment.

You will acknowledge the receipt of this letter, and report to me the day on which Mr. G. Ironside leaves Amherstburgh.

Interpreter Joseph St. Germain will accompany Mr. G. Ironside to the River aux Sables, and remain at that Station, as long as he shall be found useful.

Sir

I have the honor to receive from you a copy of a speech, the Algonquin and Nipissingue Chiefs at the Lake of the two Mountains which I received by the post on the 17<sup>th</sup> Inst<sup>ant</sup> from Lieut. Colonel Napier, Resident Agent & Supt<sup>ant</sup> Ind<sup>ian</sup> Affairs Montreal. I therefore have to request that you will explain the speech to the Chiefs, Mesjowasene, and John Esence and to inform me, if it was either of them that sent the letter mentioned as I wish to send the Wampum to the Tribe who sent the letter. The Rice Lake, and Mud Lake Indians, have complained also, of the conduct of the Algonquins & Nipissingues destroying all their Beaver on their hunting grounds.
