these two s,plendid udertakings which remain a monument to his endeavour, was given, upon his departure for the old land, a royal send-off. A great congregation of the people assembled in Mulholland's grove, in South Mountain, for a harvest home festival and to do honour to their resigning minister. The goodwill which marked the social hour was tangibly expressed in presenting Mr. Henderson with a purse of gold, an address of appreciation and photographs of both churches.

These years were momentous ones in the history of Mountain congregation. Not only had an unusually fine rural church been built—one signifying in its structure, stability of purpose and character, and one also to be, by its excellent situation, a continual witness of things eternal to the surrounding country—but better still, a deeper and more abiding unity of the spirit that had been giv-

Mr. Henderson subsequently returned to this country, engaging in the active work of the church. For some years he has been serving within the bounds of the Presbytery of Quebec, until recently at Kinnear's Falls, and now at Grand Metis.
