the Seventh.

NEW YORK, Jan. 28.—In the first of two international bouts at Madison Square Garden last night Johnny Dundee severely founced "Sapper" O'Neil of England. The local fighter conceded 10 pounds to the visiting pugilist, who weighed 135 pounds, but forced the pace from the start.

O'Neil showed gameness, but was unable to keep the fight from the start. In the second hour Owen Moran, of England, after receiving a severe punishment from "Young" Shugrue, of Jersey City, quit at the end of the seventh round. In that round Shugrue landed several rights and lefts to the head and then made the body his target. Moran claimed that one of

the body blows was too low but the referee refused to allow the claim and ordered the Englishman to continue. Moran finished the round, but at the bell throw up his hands and refused to proceed.
