BRITISH WOMEN IN THE WAR.

According to official announcement there are, at the present time 4,538,000 women and girls employed in classified trades that are under the jurisdiction of the British Board of Trade. These figures are exclusive of women employed in small trades and on the land. Domestic servants are also excluded All hospital helpers, Red Cross and other nurses are not counted. Taking all classes of British women war workers the total is over 5,000, 000.

Less than 200,000 women were employed in Great Britain before the war began and these were mostly in textile mills. The report is for 198,-000 in government offices exclusive of civil service and local government. The latter two empleyed 146,000.
