Village Council and Board of Health Meet

The local Board of Health held its last meeting of the year on December 15th. The chairman and other members all present. The minutes of the previous meetings of the year were read and adopted. The reports of the Medical Health Officer, also that of the Sanitary Inspector were read and on motion of J. J. Green and J. C. Medlar were adopted by the Board. As there was no further business to transact the Board adjourned.

The statutory meeting then took place with Reeve Smith in the chair and other members all present. The minutes of the previous meeting was read and adopted.

A communication was read from Mr. John Mitchell re exemption of taxation on a Dog which had been destroyed.

To Wm. Attridge, Sec. Treas. High School Board, balance of high school tax for 1920 in full, \$400.

On motion of councillors Atkins and Griffin, the dog tax was remitted on dogs or bitches belonging to John Mitchell, Jas. Hayes, A. E. Smith and G. P. Gordon, and that the Reeve authorized to sign and seal this resolution to give it the validity of a By-law.
