The Customs Revenue Shows Big Increase

Ottawa, Feb. 28-The total customs revenue for Canada,, for the fiscal year which ends March 31st will in all probability exceed one hundred andforty million dollars. The February figures announced by Hon. J. D. Reid tonight amounted to \$11,190,000 or \$1,062,000 more than that of the corresponding month in 1916. For the eleven months of the fiscal year the revenue amounted to \$130,739,000 as compared with \$91,946,000 in the same period of the last fiscal year an increase of \$38,793,000.
