HAD CONFIDENCE IN BUILDER.

Royal Commission on Quebec Disaster at Ottawa.

at Ottawa.

Ottawa, Sept. 27.—Before the Royal Commission, yesterday, investigating the Quebec bridge disaster, Collingwood Schreiber, consulting engineer for the Government, was closely questioned. He told of the plans for the bridge being approved and dealt with the steps in connection with the development of the project and the submission of new plans and specifications drawn by Mr. Cooper, the celebrated bridge engineer of New York. This was in 1900. These specifications were approved by order in council and by himself after they had been referred to and reported on by Mr. R. C. Douglas, the Departmental bridge engineer.

been referred to and reported on by Mr. R. C. Douglas, the Departmental bridge engineer.

At this point Mr. Schreiber explained that owing to the reputation of Mr. Cooper as a constructor of bridges, the Department relied upon his indgment largely as to the general plans, but all details were sent to Mr. Douglas to be reported on.

In response to a question by Prof. Kerry, Collingwood Schreiber explained that in 1903 he had asked to be authorized to employ a competent bridge engineer to watch the work for Government. He corresponded with Mr. Nichols, a well-known bridge engineer of New York, and also wrote to Mr. Cooper about the matter. Mr. Cooper did not favor the idea. Ke took the ground that if this were done it would take the responsibility off his shoulders. As a result and in view of Mr. Cooper's great reputation and the fact that the interests of the Dominion Government and the Phoenix Bridge Co. were identical, it was finally decided that it would be better to rely on him. The net result was that in the making of the general designs Mr. Cooper was given a rather free hand.

VEGETABLE CROP

Toronto, Sept. 27.—The vegetable crop outlook in Ontario, as reported by the crop correspondents of the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Associa-Ontario Vegetable Growers' Associa-tion, is much better than it was last month. Most of the crops look fair-ly well as the situation has greatly improved by rains. The crop with most gardeners will yield more than was anticipated, as good growth is being made. Since the rains started the growth has been steady and sure. Prices in general have been good. Prices in general have been good.

The reports indicate that the cabbage crop will be good. The same may be said of cauliflowers, except in the districts around Toronto and

Kingston.
Celery promises to yield a good crop of excellent quality. Tomatoes turned out a little better than was expected, but the crop on the whole has been very light; prices have been high. The onion crop will not be up to much; in some sections it will be fair, but in others the reports are discouraging, in the dis-Kingston. will be fair, but in others the re-ports are discouraging, in the dis-trict around Scotland, where large quantities usually are grown. Late beans are fair to plentiful. Table roots, such as carrots, beets Table roots, such as carrots, beers, parsnips and turnips, are good in all localities, except that the parsnip around Ottawa will be short, and the turnips are a failure in the Kingston district.

There has been some improvement in the potate outlook, but on the whole, the crop will be only fair.

QUESTION OF MARRIAGE During the last thirty-five years

the marriage rate in England on the basis of population has declined 22 per cent. A decided change has also taken place in England in an age at which marriages are made. Thirty-live years ago 77 out of 1,000 males in England that were married were under 21. At the present time out of every 1,000 males married, only 43 were under age. In other days out of nearly every

1,000 women married, 217 were under 21, white now in every 1,000 the minors number only 146. This is numerical evidence of the

change in the matrimonal point of view is not difficult to discover. The reason is largely economic.

For this attered condition women are largely responsible through their increasing competition with men in industrial and business life whereby the opportunities of young men for remuneration sufficient to marry upon are lessened, and the opportunities of young women to become independent of or indifferent to matrimony are increased.

The decline in the marriage rate may almost entirely be explained on economic grounds, the improved ability of young women to support themselves and the reduced ability of young men to support a home.

British Companies Scored.

Kingston, Jamaica, Sept. 27.—Resolutions were passed yesterday afternoon by the local Chamber of Commerce condemning the action of the English insurance companies.

In their defence set up in the actions arising from the Kingston disaster the companies plead they are not liable under the non-indorsation clause regarding co-insurance.
