Canada's Customs.

Ottawa, June 1.—Canada's customs collections for the eleven months of the fiscal year terminating yesterday amount to \$42,111,310, an increase of \$4,286,093 as compared with the same period of the year previous. For the month of May they amount to \$4,124,555, a gain of \$508,585.

Chatham's Crack Bowling

The star amateur players of the Chatham Bowling Club, consisting of R. G. Fleming, skip, and Messrs. Dr. J. L. Bray, Wilson Taylor and J. E. Thomas. This champion rink played a match with a rink of unfortunately dubbed inferior players, chosen as they came upon the bowling ground yesterday afternoon, this second rink being composed of Messrs. W. Robinson skip, and Messrs. J. B. Rankin, Judge Dowlin and Jonas Gonnell.

So far as the spectators on the ground were concerned, they thought that the leading team had an easy task in the Robinson aggregation. The play began and continued for 23 ends. At the end of the eleventh end the champion rink stood 15 as against nine for the non-pretentious ones. At the end of the fifteenth end the score was still in favor of the experts—15-15. At the end of the nineteenth the pickups were still behind and the score stood 20-18. At the end of the twenty-first the champions had piled up two more, making a total of 22.

At this stage matters took a turn. The champions scored no more and at the end of the game the score stood 24-22 in favor of the unlikely lookers.

The winners were cheered by the spectators and with special enthusiasm by John Lee, ex-M. P. P., who remarked that the victors were entitled to medals or some recognition for such a brilliant victory. The former prize team then proposed challenging their successful opponents to a game in the future, but upon consultation with one another the latter responded that as they had beaten the best amateur team in the club, they, and each of them, were entitled to rank as professionals, and as professionals they could under no circumstances accept a challenge from amateurs, no matter of what standing.

A GROCERS' GUILD

Crown Attorney at Hamilton Hands Out Sensational Evidence.

Hamilton, June 1.—The case against the Wholesale Grocers' Guild, on the charge of conspiracy, was called yesterday morning before the Police Court before Magistrate Jelfs and the Crown Attorney obtained evidence against the alleged combine of a highly sensational character.

Letters were submitted which showed that the guild had what it called an equalized sugar freight rate, that the rates of the railways, from whom the refiners got the difference in the form of rebates. Whether the guild got anything out of the rebate has not been shown yet.

It was shown that two grocers, Andrew McBean of Kingston and John Curtils of Port Hope, could not buy tobacco, sugar, syrup, starch or salt from the manufacturers or guild except at the retail rates.

IS A GREAT
NUISANCE

The C. P. R. Hog Pens Now
Becoming A Big
Trouble

PROMPT ACTION NEEDED

Although the G. T. R. hog-pen nuisance has occasioned much discussion in the Council from time to time, and has been strongly commented upon by several prominent citizens, very little fault has been found with the C. P. R.'s method of handling this particularly unsavory business.

The latter company, having hog-pens outside of the city, are able to minimize the trouble and little complaint has been made about their hog trade. During the last winter, however, it was found possible to use the depot hog-pens without causing the much trouble to residents of the neighboring streets, and a fair amount of business was done there.

Now that the warm weather has set in, such a practice is becoming distinctly disagreeable, and several store-keepers and others, living in the vicinity of the station, are complaining to remain in the depot a very bad stench which pervaded the whole neighborhood.

Several people have expressed their opinion that the attention of the C. P. R. officials should be called to the trouble at once, as the only way to abate the nuisance is for the pens at the depot to be thoroughly cleaned out and the business transferred to the outside pens until next winter, at least.

HE APPROVES OF IT

Was, Swears W. T. R. Preston, Necessary to the Completion of N. A. T. Co.'s Agreement—Jury Monday.

Ottawa, June 1.—Back on the stand in the Public Accounts' Committee yesterday morning, W. T. R. Preston was called upon to explain more vouchers. Samuel Barker produced one of Somerville's Government advertising accounts, dated May, 1904, for \$2,701. It had not been certified to by Preston, but the latter explained to John Ennis in February as "a very responsible fellow" was cashing \$200 cheques for the department in June. Preston could not say.

Preston was unable to say why Somerville got \$2,451.15 out of cheques, two at one time, instead of all together in one and why there were four receipts instead of one.

A letter written to Lord Strathcona on the 15th of last April, in which Preston declared that he did not know who were in the North Atlantic Trading Co. brought Mr. Barker back to the personnel. Preston said that the letter was perfectly candid. He had had a suspicion as to the individuals, but not knowledge.

Another of Mr. Barker's efforts was directed toward showing from a letter written by Preston that the North Atlantic Trading Co. people were not afraid of prosecution.

"There was a pledge of secrecy all the time," Lord Strathcona's Part.

Mr. Barker then asked if it would be fair to say that Lord Strathcona organized the company.

"We could not have formed the agreement without Lord Strathcona's assistance," said Preston, "nor concluded it without his approval."

"Can you point to one word in writing to show that the people were afraid in writing?"

Mr. Barker wanted the letter under which Preston had been allowed to look at the names of the trading company.

"Will you produce it?"

"I will not."

"Did you show the names to any member of the Government?"

"I decline to answer."

Preston said that in showing the names he had gone outside of his authority.

Mr. Barker asked again for the names, and got the usual reply, notwithstanding a favorable ruling from the chairman. He then moved that the question, ruling and answer, be reported to the House.

"I second the motion," said the Finance Minister.

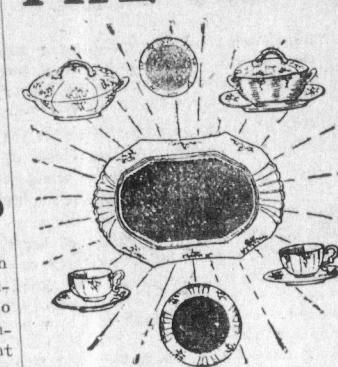
