of that place.

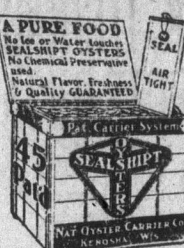

The Liberal-Conservatives of West
Middlesex yesterday placed in nomi-
nation as their candidate for the
Provincial Legislature Mr. Geo. A.
Stewart, of Strathroy. The elec-
tion will be held to fill the vacancy
in the house caused by Hon. G. W.
Ross' removal to the Senate.

An investigation into the manage-
ment of the Oxford County House of
Refuge has been requested by half a
dozen prominent ratepayers of East
Zorra. Those whose signatures are
attached to the letter claim to be able
to put forward evidence to show that
the industrial farm is being misman-
aged.

With one farmer deriving a royalty
of \$800 monthly there would seem
to be no need to water stocks in the
Tilbury oil field. There are eight
wells on his lot and he gets every
eighteen barrels. In a short time these
wells will be doubled with an ex-
treme probability of increasing his in-
come correspondingly. This rivals
Cobalt—Windsor Record.

At a committee meeting held Fri-
day night members of the Board of
Education, to whom the matter was
referred, practically decided on a
teacher to succeed Mr. Collins at the
C. C. I. Nothing has been given out
for publication, but the matter will
be finally dealt with at the regular
meeting of the Board next Tuesday
evening.

Public School Inspector Standing,
of Brantford, reports that a serious
epidemic of measles has prevailed
throughout the county of Brant for
the past week or two and has had a
decided tendency to lessen the at-
tendance at the schools. At Newport,
owing to the general spread of the
epidemic, the school has had to be
closed. At Onondaga the conditions
are reported as the same. The out-
break is not confined to any par-
ticular place, but seems to prevail
generally. Similar reports from other
counties are also heard.

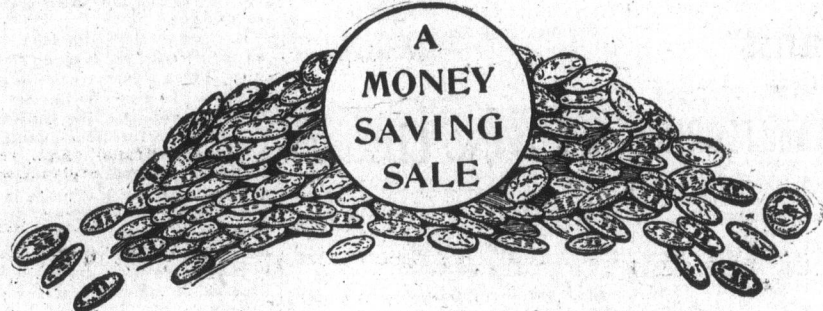
