We are sorry for this and the apple growers will be also if they produce as many apples as they did last year. But let us not borrow trouble. It generally turns out better than we fear. Special services for the promotion of religious interest in the community have been conducted by the pastor of the church in central and lower Gaspereau, with some good results. The meeting, as still continued.
