## Archangel.

One of the most astonishing things that has happened during the war has been the development and growth of the port of Archangel, which lies only a hundred miles from the Arctic Circle.  
Before the war, this port had only three piers, and its trade consisted of occasional exports of timber, fur, and fish, with a few other products of Northern Russia. Now there are 35 great piers for loading and unloading, and 103 large ware houses have been built, and still the accommodation is inadequate. For weeks together arriving steamers have to lie in the Dvina river, waiting to unload. All the time the port and city are being developed with amazing rapidity, and by the spring it is expected that adequate accommodation will be provided.  
To-day Archangel is one of the most important wheat-exporting ports of the world, for it has several miles of river frontage available for ships. Thus there is a magnificent system of inland waterways, so that goods can be shipped to nearly all the principal towns of Russia.  
The Dvina river usually begins freezing in October, but this year it was hoped to keep the port open much later by big ice-breakers.  
"Archangel is said to-day to be a peculiar aspect, reminding one of the 'hidden' American towns in the Far West created overnight." A great number of houses and shops have been put up to accommodate the overwhelming Russian business and to cater for the multitude of sailors. A tramway is being constructed along the main street, and a complete electrical lighting power plant has been put up, furnishing power for the street railway and lighting in the city.  
But there is something more wonderful even than the growth of Archangel itself. Kola, a town situated on a bay of the same name in Northern Lapland, is being developed in conjunction with Archangel. The town is being constructed along a railway that has been rapidly completed to make this port available from January to May, when Archangel is closed by ice. There will thus be a very important commercial port and shipping centre lying 150 miles to the north in the Arctic Circle!

## Good Seeds for Best Results.

Seed is always 'bad' wherever it fails to produce plants. Seed from reliable source is always good, but in most cases it is the planting that is at fault. Some plant them too deep, thus preventing germination, or, if it germinates at all, the recipient plant does not possess the necessary strength to protrude the too heavy covering of earth. Others sow altogether too sparsely, or, on the other hand, too thickly, by so doing one plant choking the other to the point of extermination. Then, too, some entertain the idea that the free application of manure on gardens is the only thing, not realizing that this commodity must be at least six months old before it is of any use to gardeners.

## GRAND OLD KING OF GRAND LITTLE COUNTRY

Nicholas and Montenegro Play Worthy Part in Europe's War—A Picturesque Ruler  
Although it numbers but 400,000 men the Montenegrin army, which has taken the field with King Nicholas at its head, will probably exert a vital influence in the Balkan situation for every one of those men is a sturdy strenuous fighter. For five centuries the Turks have tried to conquer this hardy race. Austria, too, has tried, with diplomatic trickery, to bring about a union with this gallant little nation, but without success, for the Montenegrin loves his freedom.  
A Great Warrior  
King Nicholas himself is the most picturesque royal figure in Europe. He is a magnificent soldier, and for half a century has undergone the dangers of his land through war and peace. It was in 1890 that the King, then barely nineteen, succeeded to the throne of Montenegro, owing to the assassination of his uncle Daniel. And since those far-off days he has made the father of a numerous family. In the same year that he ascended the throne he married a daughter of a Montenegrin landowner, to whom he had been betrothed since infancy. His bride was barely thirteen, and seemed very delicate; but they have had a large family—six daughters and three sons—several of whom have made brilliant marriages.  
A Royal Author's Joke  
One of King Nicholas' daughters is Queen Helena of Italy, and the King is said to have laudably referred to her as "Montenegro's most valuable export." Another daughter is the wife of Prince Joseph of Sardinia. The marriage of Prince Danilo has somewhat nearly allied the Montenegrin and the English royal families. The Crown Princess being Queen Mary's cousin once removed.  
King Nicholas is not only a strenuous soldier and a great patriot, but he is also a polished linguist and a literary genius, blessed with a full share of the poetic fervor which is characteristic of his race. He is author of many fine stirring war songs and at least two plays. Prince Danilo has inherited the warlike qualities of his father, and is a fighter first and last, and has been brought up on very Spartan lines by a father who has a great belief in the patriarchal system.

## STARVE ALL BELGIANS!

Here is one way to end the war. First, let Germany confiscate all Belgian land now in its occupation and send all the dispossessed landowners to the centre of Germany and Austria, installing German people in their places. Second, let Germany take possession of all mines, railways, factories, banks, etc., in the occupied territories. Third, let the inhabitants of the occupied territories be subjected to starvation. That would arouse such a world-wide cry for peace in the lands of the Entente powers that their governments would be compelled to sue for peace.  
Such at least, is the conclusion of Herr Rudolf Kellner, the editor of the "Trage Tagblatt." He expounds and details his scheme in a series of five articles which appeared in his journal. Herr Kellner strikes the note of brute force, naked and unshamed in his very first sentence: "Imperial Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg has said that Germany abandoned sentimentality. If that is so, Germany has not made it sufficiently plain and that is just what Germany must do."  
"Experience in Alsace-Lorraine and Schleswig-Holstein has shown that if the Central Powers would achieve, as the Chancellor said they must, frontiers which would protect them from attack in the future, they must drive out the entire population from the occupied territories and replace the present inhabitants with Germans. That would be the work of months." Herr Kellner goes on to urge: "A beginning should be made at once. There is no time to lose. It is possible now. After peace it would be no longer possible. Let us confront our enemies with an accomplished fact. It will help us in the negotiations."

## STOLE GERMAN FLAG

Great Determination Shown by English Private, Later Killed  
Details have arrived in London. England, of the daring deed performed by Private Charles Sedgwick, of the First Buffs, before he was killed in action. The German had stuck a flag over their trench to provoke the English and Sedgwick made up his mind to secure it. He crawled out under a heavy fire one evening, he reached the enemy's trench, but he failed to pull up the flag, thinking it might be a trick of the enemy and might be connected with a mine. He therefore tied a piece of string to the staff and crawled back to his own trench under fire. While trying to pull the flag into his trench he found the string broke and Sedgwick, determined to secure the trophy, crawled back again, and this time pulled up the flag in triumph. Some time afterward he was killed while throwing a bomb into a German trench.  
Russia Worth Knowing  
Russia is something more than either the East or the Third Section of Police, or the nihilist and anarchist conspiracies, and she contains vast stores of energy and inspiration in her common people, which it is well for those who study foreign politics and international relations to understand.  
If there is anything which has been an asset to Britain in the struggle it is the fact that she came before the world as the champion of international right and the defender of international law—Victor Hugo says, "In England we do not trust plagues or scraps of paper."—Lord Derby.

## Canned Fish.

Largely because of the scarcity of supplies from abroad, especially Norway and Scotland, several Maine packers will engage this year in the canning of herring in tomato sauce. It is expected that perhaps half a dozen brands will be on the market here during the summer months, with several novelties in the canned fish line. For several months there has been spasmodic inquiry for herring and other varieties, and it is doubtless in response to this that the Maine packers have prepared to supply the market. Several so-called standard brands of the herring in tomato sauce have been laid aside for several years past. The new ventures will add other brands and varieties to compete with the imported goods when, again, reaches American markets. Scotch herring prepared with tomato sauce is quoted at 2s per dozen size, while brands of the domestic fish are offering at present at 2s. It is expected that most of the new goods will reach this market at prices slightly higher than those quoted for the domestic goods, yet one brand at least will be very much cheaper.—Fishing Gazette.
