This crossing is not only a menace to public safety but is also a great annoyance to car-drivers as it is in a wretched state of repair and furnishes an awful shaking up to those who pass over it at even a very slow rate of speed. Accidents are often reported as a result of cars stalling while crossing a railway track and in the attempt to save their cars and passengers such is very liable to occur at Port Williams station. The public should demand that something be done, and at once.

DEATH OF MARK B. SHAW

News has been received of the recent death at San Bernardino, California, of Mark Bailey Shaw, a native of Westport, this county, son of the late Isaac Shaw. The deceased was in the sixtieth year of his age. He was graduated at Acadia University in the class of '86 and was married during the same year to Miss Antoinette Lewis, of Cumberland county and was ordained to the Baptist ministry. His first charge was at Yarmouth, where he did excellent work until in 1889 failing health induced him to pay a visit to California. Subsequently he spent some time in missionary work in India where he spent five years, returning to California in 1895. After filling several pastorates he retired and entered the undertaking business, in which he continued and prospered until his death. He rendered splendid service during the Mexican war and served in the Seventh California National Guards as Chaplain. He was also a member of Board of Supervisors for the Fifth District. He filled many other important positions and as leading citizen, pioneer, clergyman, soldier and mortician won respect from those with whom he came in contact. During his college days and since Mr. Shaw has been a frequent contributor to the columns of THE ACADIAN under the nom de plume of "Lee" and was a warm friend of the former editor. A few years ago he planned to visit the old scenes in his native province but was prevented from doing so. He is survived by his widow, four sons and two daughters. Dr. Carl A. Shaw, of St. Kitts, West Indies; Rev. Avery A. Shaw, D. D., pastor of Emanuel Baptist Church, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Prof. Harland B. Shaw, of Bridgewater, Mass., all graduates of Acadia, are brothers.
