S.S. CERRO GARDO

Arrives From Montreal Via North Sydney.

The s.s. Cerro Gardo, Capt. R. M. French, reached port Saturday evening with a full general cargo, the equal of 20,000 barrels, including a large quantity of flour. She left Montreal at 6.10 p.m. Saturday week, and after a delay of several hours at Quebec, where the compasses were tested, proceeded down the St. Lawrence and reached North Sydney after a good run. At 5.45 p.m. Thursday, after coaling, she left again for here and made good time along, though some delay was caused by fog and the presence of bergs, which are scattered all along the coast. The Cerro Gardo is making her first trip, and from this port will return in ballast to New York for orders. She is 265 feet long, 2223 tons gross, 1394 tons net, and has a speed of 12 knots. She carries a crew of 35 all told, and has a carrying capacity equivalent to 23,000 barrels.

Captain French was here some years ago in the steam yacht, May, owned by Mr. Van Rinsler of Philadelphia. Chief Officer E. S. Sprague also visited here 9 years ago in the yacht Aphrodite, owned by Col. Payne and which was on a salmon fishing trip. The Cerro Gardo was built at Duluth, Michigan, for the coastwise trade.

REID NFLD. CO.'S MEMORIAL TRIBUTE

The tribute of respect for our fallen heroes which will come from the Reid Nfld. Co. tomorrow will be most impressive. Over the whole vast system comprising the cross country line and branch connections every train will cease running from 10 a.m. to 10.05. At the same time the steamers on every Bay, on the Labrador route and crossing Cabot Strait will cease running, and in every shop, round house, station and plant over the country the clang of machinery will be silenced, the click of the telegraphers' machines will not be heard, section men, laborers, all employees will quit work for 5 minutes. At 10 a.m. the street cars stop in the city until 11. Not since the death of the late Sir Robert Reid has such a mark of respect been shown to any man who has departed this life in Newfoundland. It is a most solemn and worthy tribute to the fallen heroes of Newfoundland.

ALL TO STOP

The Minister of Shipping has kindly issued instructions that all shipping is to stop between 10 and 10.15 tomorrow morning. Mr. H. D. Reid, President of the Reid Nfld. Company, has kindly issued instructions that the trains of the Company will stop for five minutes to-morrow from 10 a.m. and that the street Railway will not be in operation from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m., out of respect for the deceased members of the Royal Naval Reserve and the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, in whose honor a memorial service is being held on July 1st.

A BEAUTIFUL SOLO

At the evening service in Wesley Church yesterday, which was attended by a large congregation, the people were delighted by the singing of Mr. Harry Chaplin. He rendered the beautiful new composition "Ring Out Sweet Bells of Peace" in a most melodious tenor and contributed greatly to the service. Mr. Chaplin is a comparatively new "discovery" in the world of song and we hope to hear more of him in our concert halls.

WHARF FOREMAN ASSAULTED

Mr. James Tobin, wharf foreman at Tessier & Co's, was badly assaulted Saturday by a laborer, who was engaged by the firm to keep watch on the schooner Klondyke, which is moored at the firm's wharf. About 11 o'clock Mr. Tobin visited the premises to see that everything was all right for the night, and found the watchman missing. When the latter returned he remonstrated with him, and later telephoned his employer, who instructed him to dismiss the watchman. The latter strongly objected to this proceeding, and according to Mr. Tobin's statement, assaulted him. Tobin eventually managed to get free and off the wharf and to his home. When he reached his house he sank into unconsciousness, in which state he remained for several hours. Dr. Macpherson who was called to attend him, having to administer stimulants to bring him around. Yesterday and last evening he was confined to his bed seriously ill, and it will be some days before he will be able to be about again. His assailant has been arrested and was held all yesterday and last night at the lockup. Consts. McGrath and Myers with Sgt. O'Keefe at 1.30 yesterday morning had a dangerous time of it to get Tobin's assailant out of the schooner Klondyke at Tessier's wharf.

A JOYOUS DIN

The western portion of the city certainly contributed yesterday morning to the "joyous din" which notified the populace that formal news of the declaration of peace had arrived. All the locomotives on the sidings at the Reid Nfld. Co's. premises, the many steamers at the dock pier, engines coaling near the round house blew their whistles for upwards of a half hour and around the dry dock premises proper the noise was literally deafening. No less than 11 compressed air whistles had been adjusted Saturday night at the air line on the dock and when these got going why it certainly "was a scream" in all kinds of notes sharp and flat. The various church bells and factory whistles also added their quota and last night a brilliant "fireworks" display was given by H.M.S. Briton.

ARRESTED FOR THEFT

Saturday afternoon Constable Dempsey arrested a West Ender, who is charged with stealing a quantity of coal from the Reid-Nfld. Co's premises. A report had been made the officer that thefts had been going on in this connection, and with very little to work on the arrest was made. Accused will appear before the Magistrate this morning.
