THE POUND STERLING.

The unprecedented fall in the rate of exchange of the English pound in New York is causing grave concern, and is liable to lead to a serious interruption in the trade of the two countries. The cause of the depreciation is rather difficult to explain. The effect is just as easily understood. The English pound sterling in New York has dropped in value from around \$4.80 to as low as \$4.50. The effect of this in large orders involving thousands of pounds will be readily seen. It means that for every dollar in a trade order the British government, or the British trader, must pay 30 cents extra. For example, if a British house placed an order for \$50,000 worth of goods when the English sovereign exchanged say for \$4.70, it must now pay over \$52,000. The difference in the rate of exchange has added more than two thousand dollars to the cost of the order. Seeing that orders for millions of dollars have been placed with American houses, the seriousness of the situation will be readily appreciated. Wherever it is possible the orders will be cancelled and the business between the two countries if not brought to a standstill will at least be considerably diminished, and the most curious thing about it all is that so far as we know there is no reason for it. It is due to the operations of financial plungers and manipulators, then they are guilty of a serious disservice to both countries. In ordinary times the position of Great Britain in the trade relations of the two countries has always been that of the creditor. In plain words Great Britain had always more on her books than the United States. The war has disarranged to some extent this standing of the two countries. Britain is not exporting to the same extent as

she did. Many of her industries and factories have been drafted into the munitions service of the country. At the same time larger orders than ever before in the industrial history of the two countries have been placed with the United States. The exports from the United States have increased just as much as the imports into the United States from the Old Country have decreased. As a result the balance of credit has been shifted from London to New York, or at least American credit in London has increased while British credit in New York has correspondingly decreased. There is no question of British solvency involved, and it may be that apart from this perfectly legitimate trade fluctuation with its resultant effect on credit, financial gamblers have invaded the field. In any event it should not be difficult to correct. British bankers can arrange to stiffen their credit in New York by a transfer of bullion and securities, and as it is as much to the interest of the United States as Great Britain to continue the present trade relations a remedy should be speedily found for the present state of things.

THE LATE MRS. SLOAN

Nanaimo will be much the poorer for the death of Mrs. Flora McGregor Sloan whose mortal remains were laid away amid every mark of respect and sorrow in the city cemetery yesterday afternoon. The deceased was a Nanaimoite of the second generation. Her mother has the distinction of being the first white girl to be born in Nanaimo, and here the late Mrs. Sloan was born and lived all her life. Smiling fortune had placed her in a position of affluence, a position in which she could give full vent to all her natural goodness of heart. And she found her supreme happiness in doing good to others, in helping those in distress, and cheering those in sorrow. The good she did will never be fully known. She followed the biblical injunction of doing good by stealth. In the last year or so she found a large local field to her hand. Many are the families which will remember her kindness and which are now sorrowing over her death. The societies with which she was identified will also greatly miss her services. She was an active member of several church societies and an ardent worker in the Daughters of the Empire. Almost one of the last pieces of her homework was the making of all this unusual patriotic work and while fully occupied in private charity, an inscrutable Providence has decreed her removal. As for her, she is at rest, her work done, and her reward, to which she gave never a thought herself, awaiting her in the fulness of eternity. But her friends and the community generally will miss her bright and cheery spirit, her kind and gentle disposition and her innate goodness of heart. To her husband and son particularly her loss will be felt beyond all words; but they have at least the consolation of knowing that in life her womanly worth was recognized and appreciated, and the warm and kindly sympathy of the whole community will help to soften their irreparable bereavement.

INTERIOR MILL RESUMES OPERATIONS

Victoria, B. C., Sept. 2—Advices reaching the Hon. W. R. Ross point to hopeful conditions in the Kamloops district, one mill being reported as having resumed operations quite recently and another instance quoted being that a planing mill running double shifts in order to fill prairie orders. There is likely to be a demand for small timber sales in the near future, especially in the Adams River and North Thompson sections.

The fire hazard this season has been small, and this is due in no small measure to the manner in which logging operators and settlers have co-operated with the Forest Service in the matter of slash disposal after logging and land-clearing operations. The fire situation would now appear to be safe for the rest of the season.

ANOTHER GERMAN CLAIM.

Berlin, Sept. 2—It is claimed in the official statement issued today that the German forces attacking the Russian fortress of Grodno have taken the outer forts of the stronghold.

THREATENED STREET CAR STRIKE AVERTED

Vancouver, Sept. 2—It was with a feeling of genuine relief that citizens learned this morning that the threatened strike of several thousand motor men and conductors of the B. C. Electric Railway had been averted. A compromise was arranged yesterday afternoon at a meeting between the men and officials of the company and a new agreement settled to tide over at least the period of the war, after which conditions are expected to come back again to something like normal.

This morning around the city there was quite manifest a very much better feeling towards the men who had adopted such a reasonable cause when the position yesterday had reached such a strained point. On the street cars this morning many words of approval and congratulation were given the men for the spirit of compromise they had exhibited and the same public feeling was communicated today to officials of the company. A prime feature in inducing the settlement undoubtedly was the receipt from Detroit by the officials of the union here of a telegram advising that in view of the conditions in industrial affairs, no financial help from the international union for the carrying out of a strike could be expected. This attitude of the Detroit headquarters caused a good deal of discussion and adverse comment at the mass meeting early this morning. It manifestly left a feeling of decided annoyance amongst the men, many of whom were heard to declare that a British Columbia union, or at least a union with Canadian headquarters, would have served them better in a pinch. While no official estimate is available, it is stated that during the last few years more than a hundred thousand dollars of dues from the Vancouver union members have gone to the international headquarters at Detroit.

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TURKS MASSACRE MORE ARMENIANS

London, Sept. 2—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Athens says:

"Travelers arriving from Constantinople announce that on Friday last the Turks burned the town of Ismid and massacred a large number of Armenian inhabitants."

Ismid lies at the head of the Gulf of Ismid, in Asia Minor, about 56 miles southeast of Constantinople. It has been the residence of both Greek and Armenian Archbishops. Its population is about 25,000.

Synopsis of Coal Mining Regulations.

Coal mining rights of the Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-west Territories and in a portion of the Province of British Columbia may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1. an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres will be leased to one applicant. Applications for a lease must be made by the applicant in person to the Agent or Sub-agent in the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal subdivisions of sections, and in unsurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out by the applicant himself.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5 which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available, but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per ton.

The person operating the mine shall furnish the agent with sworn returns accounting for the full quantity of merchantable coal mined and pay the royalty thereon. If the coal mining rights are not being operated, such returns should be furnished at least once a year.

The lease will include the coal mining rights only, but the lessee may be permitted to purchase whatever available surface rights may be considered necessary for the working of the mine at the rate of \$10.00 an acre.

For full information application should be made to the Secretary of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or to any Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands.
