NATIONAL HERD BOOK.

Dominion Department of Agriculture to Undertake a Much Needed Reform in Registration of 'Pure Bred Stock.'

In the House Tuesday Mr. Osman read a letter from the President of the Imperial Coal Company objecting to the passage of the bill relating to the Beersville Railway & Coal Company. Hon. Mr. Tweedie said there was nothing in the bill to justify the statements made in the letter. The road was built for carrying coal and if the Railway Co. was compelled to run the road the Coal Co. should supply it with coal to a reasonable extent. The bill was read a third time. Mr. Ryan presented the report of the Committee on Agriculture. Your Committee have held four sessions all of which have been well attended and have had under consideration a variety of subjects appertaining to agriculture. It was resolved that in the granting of assistance to roller mills in future this Committee recommend that the bond be taken from the owners for the operation of the mill for ten years, instead of five, which has been the former practice.

It was suggested by the Committee that the Department of Agriculture endeavor to get returns from the various mills which have received assistance by way of bonus as to the quantity of wheat ground, quantity of flour produced, and the charge for grinding, either by tolls or in cash.

The Commissioner for Agriculture, in answer to a question, informed the Committee that it was not the intention of the Department to make any importation of pure bred stock this year, as he was satisfied that the demand for such pure bred stock could be filled by private breeders at reasonable prices.

The different agricultural societies had within the last three years purchased and placed within their districts about \$57,000 worth of pure bred stock and that he was making every effort to induce the societies to use their money in that way, rather than in the holding of local fairs.

The Dairy Superintendents Daigle and Mitchell attended one of the meetings of the Committee and explained what was being done along the line of improvement in dairying.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Labllois it was unanimously resolved that it is the opinion of this Committee that it is desirable for the Department of Agriculture to take under consideration the advisability of making arrangements to supply seed wheat at cost price to certain sections of the province where it cannot be obtained from local dealers.

The Commissioner for Agriculture explained to the Committee the conditions under which the illustration orchards are being set out. He explained that by having these orchards cultivated and cared for in the best manner they would serve as object lessons to the surrounding country.

It was recommended by the Committee that owing to the prevailing high prices more attention must be given by the Department of Agriculture to the encouragement of poultry production.

The Commissioner for Agriculture informed the Committee that arrangements had just been completed with the Dominion Live Stock Commissioner to take over the New Brunswick Herd Registers for the different breeds of pure bred stock. At the present time registers are being kept in the different provinces which causes confusion and difficulty when sales are made to go from one province to another. It is proposed to establish a national register, viz., only one book in Canada for each breed, under the supervision of the Dominion Department of Agriculture. All animals now registered in the New Brunswick Herd book, which are eligible, will be transferred to the national register free of charge. A receiving office for applications in the national book of all pure bred stock owned in the maritime provinces will likely be established at Fredericton under the care of the Deputy Commissioner.

Penian Raid Veterans.

Mr. Hazen read a letter from George Gorham, Treasurer of the New Brunswick Military Veterans' Association, asking if their claims' services rendered in 1866 in connection with the Fenian Raid had been recognized by the government.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that some time ago the matter was brought to the attention of the Secretary of the Department. The veterans asked for 100 acres of land for each man. The difficulty was the large number who claimed land for services very much exceeded any record we had of the number of persons who had served. We thought that if such a grant was given it ought to be confined to persons who had seen active service. We have moved slowly in this matter, for in endeavoring to do right we might do a great wrong to the province.

Hon. Mr. Sweeney introduced a bill to amend the Game Protection Act.

The Restigouche Commission.

The bill to authorize a Royal Commission to consider certain charges against the Restigouche Boom Company was taken up in committee of the whole House.

Mr. McLatchy moved an amendment providing that the Commission should have the same power as a Judge with regard to granting amendments. He thought that the object of the bill was to have a thorough investigation, those who brought the charges ought to have an opportunity of amending their allegations in case the necessity for it should arise.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie said that the only objection he had to this amendment was that the bill in its present form contained the provisions which had been agreed upon by the respective parties and that it would be a breach of faith to make changes in it after the representative of one side, Mr. McLatchy, had taken his departure.

Mr. Hazen said he was one of the sub-committee who had drafted the

bill and it had been done in accordance with the agreement of Mr. McLatchy thought no injustice should be done by allowing this amendment.

Hon. Mr. LaBillois—I think in view of the great importance of this investigation to the lumbering interests of the Restigouche that the Legislature should give the most ample power to the Commissioners to make the fullest investigation.

Progress was reported for the purpose of communicating the amendment to Mr. Mott.

The following bills were agreed to— To amend the act respecting the licensing of extra Provincial Corporations.

To amend the act to facilitate the opening up to settlement of the lands of the New Brunswick Railway Co. To compensate the Hon. James Steadman for his outlay in connection with the litigation, which resulted in the establishment of riparian Fishery rights.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie presented the report of the Halifax school for the Blind. The House took recess to enable the Municipalities Committee to meet.

St. John Water Extension.

The Municipalities Committee met and heard further argument upon the St. John Lock Lomond Water bill. Mr. Barnhill appeared for Mr. Howard who owns land upon the Mispec river. Mr. Skinner and Mr. Macrae represented the city. It was stated that the city purchased the portion of the river from that part known as the Ellison & Mount Dam to the point of the Sulphite Company property. Mr. Barnhill wanted the claims for damages left entirely open. Mr. Skinner represented that if the city had not undertaken to create a new lake below Lock Lomond for the purpose of holding a supply of water that would be sufficient to give the city the right to purchase the land it wanted, and then in the dry season of the year would give to the persons on the river as much water as if the city had not interfered at all and therefore that some care should be used in allowing persons to make sufficient claims.

After argument the Municipalities Committee considered and recommended the bill.

Prevention Forest Fires.

Judge Hanington appeared in support of the bill to amend the act for the prevention of forest fires in Westmorland. The present act prohibits the burning of the lands of the province from the 1st of April to the 15th of June and from the 1st of September to the 15th of October. The bill permits fires to be kindled for the clearing and improving of lands for agricultural purposes within these periods with the permission of the chief ranger or deputy ranger of the province. The judge argued at length with regard to the necessity for this change. Mr. Powell was heard in support of the bill. The Committee heard it into consideration.

Evening Session.

After recess Hon. Mr. Tweedie resumed the session by continuing the charter of the Grand Falls Water Power Co. for the purpose of adding a section making any bye law authorizing the issuing, allotment or sale of the unissued stock of the company at a discount valid if confirmed at an annual or general meeting. The bill was reported to the House, read a third time and passed.

Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the act respecting the charter of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Mr. Robertson introduced a bill to amend the Act incorporating the Imperial Dry Dock Company.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill in amendment of the Property Act. He explained that it was to make it clear that a conveyance from husband to wife or wife to husband should be as valid as if through a trustee.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to ratify and confirm the lease from the Crown to the Grand Falls Water Power Company; also a bill relating to the Province of New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill relating to the development of the coal areas in Queens and Sunbury. In the course of the evening all these bills were read a second time.
