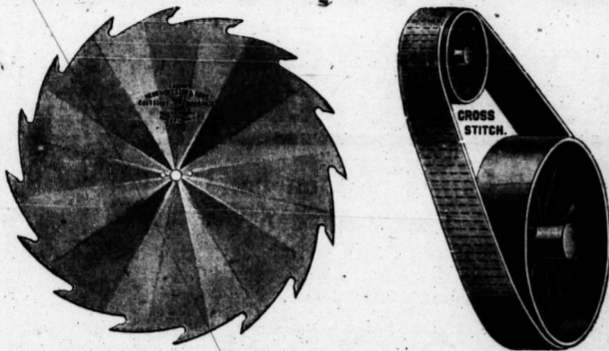

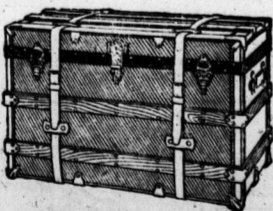

STR. POKONOKET SOLD

Was Run on the Fredericton-St. John Route During the Season of 1905.

The Present Outlook for Suitable Accommodation This Season Not Very Bright.

WARING BURNED AND SPRINGFIELD DAMAGED.

ST. JOHN, April 11.—Yesterday the Star Line steamer Pokonoket, which during last summer ran between St. John and Fredericton, was sold to a company in Norfolk, Va. The purchase price is said to be \$35,000, and the transfer will be made at once. A crew is now being engaged here to take the steamer south, but previous to leaving larger propellers will be put on to replace the small ones found necessary for the river traffic.

The Pokonoket was purchased in Philadelphia eighteen months ago for \$21,000. The duty amounted to \$6,000 and repairs costing \$15,000 were

made, bringing the total cost up to \$42,000. The steamer Hampstead opened river navigation today, leaving early this morning for Carter's Point. The sale of the Pokonoket, added to the loss of the Beatrice Waring and damage to the Springfield, will necessitate a lot of shuffling among the river steamers. The Star Line will likely purchase the Champlain for the Fredericton route until a better boat can be obtained. The Springfield will be repaired and when insurance matters are settled a new steamer will likely be bought to replace the Waring.

SOCIAL EVENT AT ST. JOHN.

Miss Josephine Troop Wedded to Charles E. McPherson.

Happy Couple Leave for New Home at Winnipeg.

Many Costly and Beautiful Presents Received—The Gown.

ST. JOHN, April 11.—At the residence of Howard D. Troop, Orange Street, father of the bride, Miss Josephine Troop, one of the most popular young ladies in St. John socially, was today united in marriage to Charles E. McPherson, of Winnipeg, assistant general passenger agent of the Canadian Pacific Railway. The marriage was a very quiet one, being performed in the presence of only a few intimate friends of the parties. The drawing rooms of Miss Troop's home were very tastefully decorated with hyacinths, narcissi, tulips and Easter lilies, and the general effect was beautifully spring like.

Miss Troop's gown was an exquisite creation of princess lace over white tulle, with full train, a point lace bridal veil and orange blossoms.

Miss Jennie McLaughlin was bridesmaid, her costume being of point d'esprit over pink tulle, with white leghorn hat. High Sheriff Robert S. Ritchie supported the groom.

The ceremony was performed by Dr. Sprague, of Centenary Church, assisted by Rev. G. M. Campbell of Queen Square Methodist Church and took place at half past three o'clock.

General Superintendent Downie placed his private car at the disposal of Mr. and Mrs. McPherson and they leave this evening for their western home, stopping en route at New York, Montreal and Toronto.

Many magnificent presents were received. From the office of the C. P. R. western division came a cabinet of table silver complete in every detail. The Mont Club sent a beautiful service in a massive mahogany casket, and for the groom a travelling bag with sterling silver fittings.

Mr. McPherson's office staff in Winnipeg sent a cut glass water set; the ticket office staff a costly bronze statuette with electrical fittings and the Toronto passenger department office a beautiful glass salad bowl with silver service.

RACE TROUBLES.

French Majority in Sections of Manitoba Have Little Regard for English.

WINNIPEG, April 11.—Trouble is beginning at St. Boniface between the French and the English sections. The assessment of one English ward is \$20,000, while the French ward is the same. The voting power of the English speaking part is much weaker than the French, who have six councillors and the mayor, while the English have only two councillors. The English asked for more representation, but the Council turned them down. Now they are appealing to the Municipal Commission, and the treasurer of the town has sent a letter to all prominent Frenchmen to stand up for their rights.

OBSTREPEROUS JURIES

Ontario Authorities Likely to Drop Murder Cases at Belleville.

TORONTO, April 11.—In spite of the Belleville assertion that other arrests in the Lloyd murder case are likely the investigation will not continue. Inspector Murray has his own opinion as to the story. "Some one else knew more about the murder of Mrs. Lloyd than did her husband. I never had two stronger cases of circumstantial evidence," said Mr. Murray, "than in the Diamond and Lloyd cases; but you can't get a jury down there to convict."

SENATOR WARK'S LIBRARY.

University of New Brunswick To Receive Magnificent Collection.

Over 100 Volumes and Chiefly Economic in Nature.

U. N. B. Athletic Remembered by Lady Basketball Players.

Through the kindness of Miss Helena A. Wark the University of New Brunswick is to receive the magnificent collection of books and Parliamentary papers of the late Senator Wark, amounting to over a hundred volumes. These books which are chiefly economic in their nature will be of infinite use to the department of economics in the University and will doubtless be of service in the weekly debates held by the Literary and Debating Society. The Normal School lady basketball players presented J. D. McBeath of Toronto a very handsome moroccan travelling companion in appreciation of his services as coach of their team during the basketball season which closed on Saturday with a great victory for the Normal School.

EASY COME, EASY GOES

One of the Results of Indiscriminate Charity—Newsboys Harvest.

TORONTO, Ont., April 11.—From all that can be learned here it appears that several agencies that are helping the unemployed in the old country to emigrate are paying certain sums to immigrants on their departure from Montreal and that as if to prove the old adage Easy Come, Easy Goes, money is laid out on the way to Toronto in purchases from newsboys of fruit, cakes and odds and ends on the train. Two of these boys have lately bought horses with their earnings of the last six weeks and others have very handsome balances in the Savings Bank.

COBALT PROPERTIES.

New Proposition to Be Floated with Capitalization of \$1,650,000.

COBALT, April 11.—Despite the denial made in certain quarters, Cobalt Consolidated Mines, Limited, has acquired control of fifty-eight acres of Hudson Bay property. This included a mine from which the Hudson Bay has shipped ores that have made it famous, and today a proposition known as the Silver Queen will be floated and its stock put on the market. The first allotment consists of 75,000 shares, par value \$1,650,000, which will be distributed among the brokers of Cobalt; New Liskard and Halseyburg.

NEW THEATRE.

Toronto to Have a \$250,000 Structure Ready for Burlesque in October.

TORONTO, April 10.—The new theatre to be built by F. W. Stairs, manager of the Star Theatre, will be a burlesque house and will cost, including site, over \$250,000, and is expected to open in October.
