Next Few Days Will Tell What Murphy Thinks About Bill Sharen for Big Line

Nominations for Early Closers of the Grand Circuit Will Reveal

RICH STAKES FOR TROTTERS

But Both He and Lady Grattan Must Go Down a Few Seconds.

The first intimation of what Thomas Murphy, the Poughkeepsie wizard, really thinks of Bill Sharen, 2:11 1/4, after having him in his stable for several months, will probably come this week.

A few days ago the stakes for the Grand Circuit closed at the North Randall track at Cleveland, Ohio, on July 49 closed and when the entries for these early closers are announced and those of the following meetings are given out it will show whether the Fredrickson bred trotter is to be staked down the "Big Line" in the richest events of the season or not.

Bill Sharen is eligible to the 2:12 trot; in a good many cases the richest purses are for faster classes, but if Murphy thinks the big chestnut trotter is good enough to beat the best he will stake him where the biggest money is in sight regardless of how hard the battling is going to be. That is Murphy's plan; he goes after the big purses, and results have shown he makes few mistakes.

At Cleveland, for instance, there is the Ohio, a \$5,000 stake for 2:08 trotters, and if Bill Sharen is not started there he will have to race in a class event as the only slow stake is The Tavern Steak, which is for trotters eligible to the 2:14 class. The following week at Toledo, Ohio, The Teumseh, a \$5,000 event for 2:12 trotters, just fits the Sharen horse and it is just as rich an event as anything on the program, but at Kalamazoo, the next week, Bill Sharen will have to race in a 2:08 stake again, or else go into the class event.

Lady Grattan's Prospects.

Some years ago A Game of Chance 2:03 1/4, won the Edwards stake in his debut on the Grand Circuit, having been purchased for Walter R. Cox, the noted New Englander, from W. Bert Lint, of this city, by John Farnum, of Boston, and this year The Edwards stake may be the first race in which Lady Grattan, 2:09 1/4, will appear on the racing Grand. The Edwards is worth \$5,000 and is for 2:08 pacers, and the race for the New Brunswick Hotel \$2,000 stake or start in one of the class events, which will include a 2:10 pace.

If Lyman Brule, who is to race Brage, 2:11 1/4, in his stable, hits the Grand Circuit at the opening at North Randall he will have a chance to start the son of Baring in The Tavern Steak for 2:14 trotters there. The Turkey Trot, a \$2,000 event at Toledo, is open to 2:17 trotters but those with heat records of 2:13 or better are barred, so Brage is ineligible as a result of that opening heat in 2:11 1/4 he won from Bill Sharen here last July. Brage will, therefore, have to start in the Teumseh, where Bill Sharen is also eligible as a 2:12 trotter, or else be satisfied with the class races. Brage's win race is 2:15 1/4 and was made in 1919 so that he is ineligible to 2:18 trotts; there is a 2:16 class trot on the program for Kalamazoo while the

Adioo Guy Goes to Auction, May Come East Again

Adioo Guy, 2:00 3/4, has been consigned to the Blue Ribbon auction sale, the Fasig-Tipton Company's spring sale at Madison Square Garden, New York.

Reports have recently been spread that Adioo Guy might come back to the Maritime Provinces and there is some speculation as to whether or not he is the pacer Len R. Acker, the Halifax theatre owner, has had his eyes on the free for alls on the Maine and New Brunswick Circuit. Grace Direct, 2:00 1/2, is another that has been mentioned and she is going to the Blue Ribbon sale next week, too.

Adioo Guy was formerly owned by "Kid" O'Neill, of Halifax, N. S., who started him on his 1919 campaign in Fredericton. He won the free for all here on Dominion Day and afterwards won his races on the Bay State and Orange County Circuits. He was then sold to W. L. Johnson, millionaire shoe manufacturer of Endicott, N. Y., for \$5,000 and finally hit the Grand Circuit, getting his mark at 2:00 3/4 at Lexington, but finding Sanardo, 2:00 1/2, the star pacer of the Murphy stable, too tough a nut to crack.

Adioo Guy now goes to the auction in the complete dispersal of Mr. Johnson's Ideal Farm. If he comes "Down East" he will find some tough battling ahead when he meets Calgary Earl, 2:02 1/4, now in Harry Nevers' stable at Houlton, Me.—J.D.B.

ROYAL MCKINNEY IS TO RACE FOR \$1,000

Aroostook Pacer is Ready to Meet Any Horse in Maine or New Brunswick

The Fort Fairfield Driving Club is said to be willing to match Royal McKinney against any horse in Maine or New Brunswick, over the Fort Fairfield ice course, best three in five, one-fourth-mile heats, for money up to \$1,000 a side. "Tom Donahue, the horse that made the fast time at Gardiner some days ago, of some enthusiasts called the world's record, went in 29, 30, 28 1/2, and 29 1/2, an average of 29 3/8, while Royal McKinney's average for his race was 29 3/8, about seven-tenths of a second faster.

The owner of Arlene is said not to be satisfied over the result, as the horse is reported to have had some trouble with her shoes, which caused her not to be at her best in the third heat. He wants a return match which Mr. Seeley, owner of Royal McKinney, says he is willing to give him at any reasonable time and for any reasonable money.

Ole McGregor, owned by Mr. McBurnie, and Sadie Ashbourne, owned by John H. Seeley, raced on the ice at Presque Isle stream last Friday afternoon for \$100 a side. Sadie Ashbourne won the first and fourth heats, and Ole McGregor the second, third and fifth, of course, taking the race. The best time was 30 1/2 seconds.
