Mysterious Women of Egypt. There are semifingly more types of wemen in Gairo, all of them natives of Egypt, then in any other eity of like population in the world. Their variety is due largely to the difference in cos-tume, which is regulated by religious be-liefs. All the women of Mohammedan faith wear veils. Some wear queer little spools of brass or gold, which are at-tached to the head-piece, and which hang down to cover the nose. This signifies that the wearers are married. Others wear veils without either head-piece or nose covering. The vells of the Turkish woming are the handsomeat, and they are party were met in carriages by the civic authorities with an electric car, in which they rode a distance of twenty miles
