BOAT CAPTURED

U. S. Vessel Charged With Piracy on High Seas.

Mexican Gunboat Ran Her Down-Crew Arrested.

Medridia, Mexico, Oct. 2.-The American fishing boat Caldwell P. Colt. sus pected of being engaged in actual piracy, is lying at the docks in Progreso, and her captain, Joseph H. Schlosse, and her crew are held pending an investigation, was captured in Mexican wa ters by the gunboat Bravo and brough into this port. Captain Schlosse has ad-

into this port. Captain Schlosse has admitted that the Colt is owned by an exporting house at Pensacola. She is equipped with several rapid fire guns. The suspicious conduct of the vessel caused the Bravo to run her down and take her into port.

A corps of customs officers has been sent aboard to make an inventory of her cargo, and both cargo and vessel will be declared forfeited to the Government. The crew is being detained at the police The crew is being detained at the police station until the investigation is completed. The capture of the vessel has created a sensation among shipping men at this port.
