Municipality of Albert.

Sent Annual Session.

Cover House, July 2nd, 1889.

The Council convened as ordained by law, the Warden in the chair. All the Councilors were present except Councilor J. N. Smith and E. A. Blakely.

The Council adjourned until 1 p. m. and at that hour it convened, the Warden in the chair, Councilor Smith and Blakely still absent. The minutes of last session were read and approved.

A very largely signed petition from residents of Hillsboro is read praying that a tax may be imposed on cash and every dog kept within the County of Albert.

It is then moved by Councilor Duffy and seconded by Councilor H. B. Steeves, that the sum of one dollar be collected from every person owning or having or keeping on his or her premises any dog, and that a Collector be appointed to collect the said tax, and that the Collector be allowed twenty five per cent. of all amounts collected from the owners or keepers of any such dogs.

It is moved as an amendment to the above by Councilor West and seconded by Councilor Blakely, that the matter be referred to the committee on Bye Laws to report to the Council on the advisability of taxing dogs (Carried).

Dr. Purdy, chairman of the Board of Health, appeared before the Council and made some remarks concerning the sanitary condition of the market. The matter is left in the hands of the committee on County Property, with instructions from the Council to do the necessary work.

An application to grant a License for the steamer Arbutus to carry passengers from Hopewell Cape to Dorchester Island is not granted.

On motion of Councilor West and seconded by Councilor Blakely, the Secretary is authorized to collect all Non-Resident taxes of the Parish of Alma without unnecessary delay.

On motion of Councilor Duffy seconded by Councilor H. B. Steeves, it is ordered that the sum of \$2.10 be refunded to Samuel H. Steeves of Elgin and charged to Parish of Hillsboro.

The committee on Bye Laws report that they are in favor of imposing a tax of one dollar on each dog in the County of Albert. (Report not adopted).

On motion of Councilor Duffy seconded by Councilor H. B. Steeves, it is ordered that a tax of one dollar be levied and collected from the owner or keeper of any and every dog owned or kept in the Parish of Hillsborough, and that twenty five per cent. of the amount collected be allowed the Collector and the balance be paid to the Treasurer of this Municipality to be applied to the maintenance of the Poor of the said Parish of Hillsborough.

The following committee's report is submitted, viz: "Mr. Warden and Gentlemen. Your committee, appointed at the last session to investigate the claims of the Parish of Elgin for the reduction of their indebtedness, and that twenty five per cent. of the amount collected be allowed the Collector and the balance be paid to the Treasurer of this Municipality to be applied to the maintenance of the Poor of the said Parish of Hillsborough."

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On motion it is ordered that the Secy. Treas. notify the Auditor when the books are ready for auditing, and that the books be audited in the office occupied by the Secy. Treas., or at such other office as the Auditor may see fit.

The following resolution submitted by Councilor Collett and seconded by Councilor West is passed, viz: Whereas, a number of Coupons of the date of 1876 and 1877, amounting to \$117.00, have not been presented for payment: Therefore, resolved, that said amount be credited to Parish of Elgin, with the understanding that it said Coupon are presented for payment the Secy. Treas. change the date to account of Elgin.

A bill of O. A. Peck Esq., County Registrar of Births, Deaths etc., for supplying 200 forms of Schedule A is received and placed on file.

A bill of Benj. Bray for conveying a passenger, Wm. Baidley, to Dorchester Penitentiary is received and placed on file.

On motion of Councilor West seconded by Councilor Collett, it is ordered that every owner of a dog be required to have a metal collar placed on the neck of his or her dog with the owner's name thereon, and if any dog is found after the first day of September next without such collar the owner of such dog may be fined one dollar, one half of said fine to go to the person bringing such notice, the other half to the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish where said fine is collected.

On motion of Councilor Duffy seconded by Councilor H. B. Steeves, it is ordered that the Collector of taxes on dogs after giving one month's previous notice by advertisement in three public places in the Parish of Hillsborough, proceed to collect from the owner of each and every dog the sum of one dollar, said notice to be posted on or before the first day of October in each year.

Manning Duffy is appointed Parish Clerk of the Parish of Hillsborough in room of T. E. Bray who has removed from the place.

Councilor adjourned sine die. W. O. WARDEN, Secy. Treas. G. H. MASON, Warden.

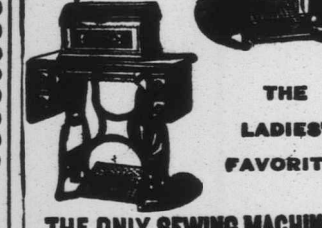

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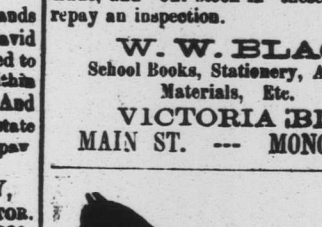
