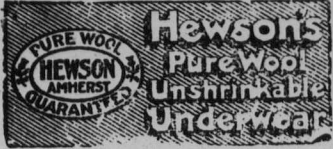


THE LOCAL NEWS

HOUSE AWARDED

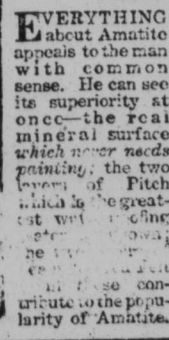
