#### THE FOOD SITUATION

We are informed from the Food Controller's office. Ottawa, that the food situation in the Allied countries of western Europe is grave than it has been at any time since the beginning of the war. Informs tion has been received by the Food County Council Controller which shows that the ut most effort must be made to in crease spring acreage and to secure a much larger production of bread grains in 1918 than was done in 1917. Mr Hoover has already pointed out that if ships have to be sent to more able to carry soldiers and supplies from this continent, with a result that the continued participation of the United States and Canada in the war will be greatly hampered
