Britain Also Ready to Give Fullest Support Through Her Fleet in the Black and Baltic Seas.

(By Jas. M. Tuohy.) Paris, Jan. 3.—The arrival in Paris of British Foreign Secretary Balfour is due to a desire to reach an agreement on the increasingly difficult and urgent problems dealing with Russian Bolshevism and its threatened extension to Germany.

The situation in Poland. TO ESTABLISH FRENCH CREDITS IN CANADA

(Canadian Press) Ottawa, Jan. 6.—With reference to the matter of Canadian credits to be available for the purchase of commodities in Canada, required for the rebuilding and reconstruction of France, it is stated officially, that immediately after the signing of the armistice negotiations were opened by the Minister of Finance with representatives of the French Government in the United States looking to the establishment of such credits.

TO ALLOW TRANSPORT OF PROVISIONS THROUGH DUTCH WATERWAYS

London, Jan. 6.—(British Wireless Service)—The Dutch Government, according to an official announcement made today, has met favorably the request of the British Government that facilities be granted for the transport of provisions for troops of occupation in Germany through Dutch waterways, particularly the Scheldt, and for the use of this river for the passage of demobilized troops returning home.

DR. CAMPBELL WELL KNOWN HALIFAX PHYSICIAN DEAD (Canadian Press) Halifax, Jan. 6.—Dr. D. A. Campbell, who has been practicing medicine in Halifax since his graduation at the old Halifax Medical College in 1874, died tonight. He had been confined to his room for the past ten weeks. He had one son who died some years ago and in whose memory he endowed a chair of anatomy at Dalhousie College. He was sixty-six years old and was born near Toronto.

POLES CAPTURE CITY 50 MILES EAST OF BERLIN

Army of 30,000 Marching on German Capital Enter Frankfurt-on-the-Oder

TEUTONS REFUSE TO FIGHT Many Demobilized Decline to Take up Arms, Although Opposition is Expected.

Copenhagen, Jan. 2.—A Polish army of 30,000 men is marching on Berlin, according to a dispatch received here, quoting rumors at the German capital. Gustave Noske, member of the Ebert Cabinet, in charge of military affairs, is said to have ordered the Fifth German Division to meet the Poles.

It is also reported that the Polish government at Warsaw has ordered the mobilization of all Poles.

Geneva, Jan. 2.—The Polish army which is marching toward Berlin has as its object "a tearing raid into Germany," according to the Polish agency at Lausanne.

Infantry Strongly Supported The infantry is well armed and is supported by artillery and cavalry.

London, Jan. 2.—Polish troops have entered Frankfurt-on-the-Oder, fifty miles east of Berlin, says a Berne dispatch to the Associated Press.

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GOOD OPENINGS FOR CANADIAN TRADE IN EUROPE

Lloyd Harris Looking Over the Situation in Belgium and Rumania—Large Supplies of All Kinds Needed for Rebuilding in the Ruined Countries.

London, Jan. 3.—(Special cable from John W. Daffoe)—Lloyd Harris is visiting the continent to look over the situation in Belgium and Rumania and to confer with the Government of those countries. Large supplies of all kinds are needed for rebuilding in the ruined countries and there is sound ground for expecting that a considerable proportion of these goods will be bought in Canada, the Government in each case being the purchaser and assuming responsibility for all payments.

There would appear to be opening for Canadian trade in the Balkans and Rumania. As for trade generally between Canada and Great Britain there is every indication that it will develop rapidly on normal business lines, once restrictions along co-operative lines are removed. It is understood that it is the policy of the British Government to remove these restrictions, but it is still necessary to secure licenses to import and there is trouble in getting them, owing, in a measure, to the state of the exchange market.

London, Jan. 5.—(British Wireless Service)—The estimated number of British prisoners of war in Germany on December 29, according to information from Berlin, was 24,900 of whom 5,000 were in trains proceeding to Holland and 8,000 were expected to reach Holland within the next few days.

British prisoners to the number of 7,000 are being repatriated by way of Baltic ports during the week beginning December 29. Since the date of the armistice 6,814 officers, 126,728 other ranks and 4,485 civilians have been repatriated.

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\$58,000,000 UNDER BUSINESS PROFITS WAR TAX ACT

More Than Double the Estimate Made in the Budget Speech in Which the Act was Introduced.

(Canadian Press) Ottawa, Jan. 6.—The total amount of assessments made under the Business Profits War Tax Act to date is over fifty-eight million dollars, of which over fifty-four million dollars have been collected. It is estimated that by the end of the present fiscal year about sixty-five million dollars will be realized. This is more than double the estimate made in the budget speech in which the Business Profits War Tax Act was introduced.
