RESTORATION OF THE STATE DINNER

Fredericton, Feb. 25—The state dinner in connection with the opening of the Legislature, a function which was dispensed with last year, is to be restored.

This was announced to-day in connection with the opening of Government House in Fredericton, for the first time in about thirty years, when Evelyn Grove, which Hon. William Pugsley has leased, became known as Government House to-day.

The only social function on the day of the opening of the session of the Legislature will be the usual reception from 4 to 6 p. m. for while the state dinner is being restored, it will not be held on the date of the opening of the session, as was formerly the case, but will follow the day after on Friday, March 3rd. Another innovation will be that the wives and daughters of those who are officially entitled to be present at the state dinner, have been invited to a function at Government House the same evening; the dinner will take place at 7 p. m. and the reception afterwards at 9 p. m.

BATHURST MAN WAS VICTIM OF HORRIBLE DEATH

Bathurst, Feb. 24—Charles Huard, aged 48, met a horrible death yesterday afternoon while working at the pulp mill of the Bathurst Company, Limited, here when he fell into one of the digesters being charged with chips and caustic liquor. The distressing fatality happened about half past four and the remains of the unfortunate were not recovered until 8 o'clock this morning. Huard was engaged with another man named Chas. Duguay in keeping the chute which leads into the digester clear of chips and in some manner as yet unexplained both he and Duguay did not notice the signal given by the pulp cooks that they were about to drop the chips into the digester. The two men dropped with the chips when the digester was opened, but Duguay was able to catch a beam and hold clear for a short time and when he fell after a few minutes he did not go all the way into the digester.

As the disappearance of the men was noticed Duguay was found and extricated. Huard was carried into the digester with the chips and met a fearful death either by drowning in the caustic liquor or by suffocation.

MISSION FIELDS OF CENTRAL CHINA

Montreal, Feb. 24—After two years on furlough, Rev. W. B. Williston is arranging to return to his work in the Mission fields of Central China. He is to speak at conferences in Toronto, Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver, before sailing from Vancouver on March 23 on the Canadian Pacific "Empress of Russia." Mrs. Williston and their three children will accompany him. Mr. Williston was for ten years stationed in the Province of Schewezan, in Central China, and it is his intention on his return to start from the outskirts of his former district and work towards the borders of Tibet. Among the friends whom he leaves behind him are to be numbered very many children, for wherever Mr. Williston went he had an irresistible attraction for the children and they thronged around him to listen to the wonderful things he had to tell.

THE CONSERVATIVES TO GATHER AT OTTAWA

OTTAWA, Feb. 25—A large attendance of Conservatives is expected at the party conference which opens here on March 6, as a preliminary to the coming session. Right Hon. Arthur Meighen is here preparing for the conference and parliamentary session. Hon. H. H. Stevens, former minister of trade and commerce, is reported to be on his way east from Vancouver, as are other Conservatives resident at distant points. The agenda of the conference, it was officially stated today, has not yet been finally completed. But the question of leadership is regarded as certain to arise and the general expectation is that Mr. Meighen will be confirmed in the position and also that he will be leader of the official opposition in the next House.

Party organization will be one of the further subjects for discussion.
