FIELD COMMISSIONER AFFAIRS OF LIQUOR COMMISSION

Report by Richard Sullivan and Associates.

Hon. Mr. Tilley said on Thursday that shor ly after the p esent Gov rnment took over office, it was decided to make an investigation of the affairs of the Provincial Liquor Commission and for this purpose, tended by both boys and interested Richard J. Sullivan, Saint John, was appointed to make a report. This report is to the effect that the gross ment warehouse at Fredericton is \$257,940.36; that the assortment is poorly balanced and lacking in a marked degree the necessary higher brands; and that there is an over stock of domestic brands. The report says that loss sustained in extra freight by transporting goods !- in tidewater to the capital would be over \$7,000 and that if this warehouse was in Saint John, instead of Fred eriction, this amount would be saved by the province. Several recommen dations are made, including that selecting a member of the board of commissioners, a man of practical experience, and Laving the requisite technical knowledge "and thus avoid a repetition of conditions as they exist today." Also the following:

"We would recommend that after some fixed date the commission cease selling draught liquors except
