Address to the Papal Delegate.

Your Excellency.—The Church of Nfld. which only once before and that many years ago, received the visit of an Apostolic Delegate, welcomes you heartily to-day. The lady, the religious bodies, but particularly the priests, the Holy See's most loyal sons, greet you as their Leader and Teacher and Father. All recognize you as the representative of our Holy Father, Pope Pius, and it is to you who take the place of the Vicar of Christ in their regard. Consequently all rejoice at this most unexpected and auspicious visit and say to you, Excellency with all their hearts: "Welcome! A thousand times welcome!"

The sufferings which our Irish ancestors formerly endured for the sake of their faith are a matter of history. Confessions, transportation, bodily tortures, even death itself, they often preferred rather than to false to their faith or fall in the obedience due to the Roman Pontiff. Even in this island our great grandfathers had their own share of troubles to undergo, in order to live up to their religion and educate their children according to the dictates of their conscience. These memories we are proud of, and they shall always be our boast.

We are merely then walking in the footsteps of those ancestors and following out their teaching when we testify our reverence and respect to you. Here and There.

DISPLAY OF FIREWORKS.—When the Demonstration in honour of Bishop Power reaches Patrick Street tomorrow night there will be a brilliant display of fireworks under supervision of Mr. P. Hanley. He has selected the fireworks himself.

SUDDEN DEATH.—The Deputy Minister of Justice received the following message from Magistrate Power, of Bell Island, this morning:—"Thomas Green, of Little Bay, Port-au-Fort, died suddenly of heart failure at mines last night."

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The Tories Denounce Asquith.

LONDON, To-Day. Special to Evening Telegram. The past 24 hours have brought small change in the political situation. The Unionist party newspapers join in a chorus of hot denunciation of Asquith for what they term a violation of parliamentary decencies. The majority of the Conservative party in London and the provinces advise the leaders to submit to Asquith's ultimatum as the lesser of two evils. A small but important minority exhort the peers to rally to Chamberlain's watchword, "Fight to death." The only uncertain factor in the affair is how many Lords will follow Halsbury in the fight to the death. The Prime Minister has notified the peers he would not send the Veto Bill back from the Commons to them unless assured they would support it. Meantime interest centres in the meeting of the Commons to-day when Asquith is expected to make a more explicit statement of his program.

Police Court.

Had a History.

The s.s. Amethyst, which was lost at Cape Mutton on Saturday, had a rather historic career. She was owned by F. J. L. Fitz, of Eastern H.R. Shediac, N.S., and was one of the vessels which Lieut. Hobson sunk in the channel at the entrance to Santiago Harbor, Cuba, when he tried to bottle up Admiral Cervera's Spanish squadron there during the Hispano-American conflict. The Assistant Collector had the following message from Inspector O'Reilly of the Florida, dated Trepansey, Saturday night:—"Amethyst's decks awash, vessel total wreck. Cargo of 1,500 brls. flour, greater part saved; 1,000 sacks oats all under water; 65 head of cattle, some saved, many drowned. Five horses, 53 sheep, 2 calves, 2 pigs saved and landed at Trepansey. Some ashore at Cape Mutton."

Honor to Whom Honor is Due.

Editor Evening Telegram. Sir.—Allow me through the columns of the People's Paper to ask our Roman Catholic friends, especially those of the West End, a question: What would they think, say and do if their Protestant co-religionists put across a public street banners with such legends as "Long may His Lordship Bishop Jones reign over Terra Nova"; or "Long may President Holmes reign over Terra Nova"? I am prompted to ask this question because there is a large banner across New Gower Street with the words, "Long may His Grace the Archbishop reign over Terra Nova." As this legend is applicable rightly only to His Majesty the King, and Chamberlain's watchword, "Fight to death," it is particularly objectionable to Protestants, not only of the city but of the Island; and I think when the matter is brought to the attention of our Roman Catholic friends, and more especially to that of our respected Mayor, Mr. Ellis, they will have it removed. I am of opinion that the gentlemen who form the Committee which has charge of this grand display have never seen the banner I refer to, and that they would not have allowed it to be displayed if they had seen it. Wife Murderer Cheats the Gallows.

Beaver, Penn., July 18.—Charles Hickman, who was to have been hanged here to-day for the murder of his wife, Mollie, in February, 1910, collapsed in his cell in the county jail during the night and died this morning at 8 o'clock. Hickman escaped from jail twice after his conviction, and Saturday night that attempted to take his life by inhaling gas. He repeatedly told the guards he would never live to be hanged.

No More Need of That Terrible Nausea After an Operation.

Toledo Surgeon Devises Great Boon to Knife Victims Who "Come Out From Under" Free From Nausea Torment. Toledo, Ohio, July 1.—Two little gas bags attached to a simple contrivance have robbed ether of its sickening terrors—and its dangers. The discovery of the anaesthetic value of the apparatus is hailed as a wonderful boon to humanity sixty years ago, but it remained a boon of bitter memory to all who took it. The old way of giving ether is to pour it on a sponge over the patient's nose. He is half asphyxiated and when he awakes he is sick to his stomach. He is sick at all. Then follow terrible hours of nausea and thirst. The victim mustn't have water, because water induced vomiting, and that sometimes bursts out stitches. Eliminates Ether Sickness. Sometimes the patient never comes to. The new way eliminates ether sickness and the danger of asphyxia. It makes ether as safe as laughing gas and as pleasant, without entailing the enormous expense involved in using that anaesthetic for long operations. Dr. John S. Pyle, a Toledo surgeon, is the inventor. It has been used in many operations, major and minor, and its success has been fully demonstrated. Dr. Pyle's anesthetic is a "mixer" through which the patient breathes air, vaporized ether (or chloroform), nitrous oxide (laughing gas), or oxygen, either singly or in any desired combination or proportion. The apparatus consists of a glass globe, or mixing chamber, to which are connected three atomizers, one for the gas, one for the ether, and one for the pure oxygen. Layers of gauze in the mixing chamber insure the perfect mixing of the gases. Patient Comes to Himself Pink and Warm. Perfume is sprayed on a piece of gauze in the mask before it is strapped to the patient's face. His nostrils white roses. Presently the odorless laughing gas is turned into the globe. When that subtle-anesthetic has done its work ether is substituted. The patient, already happily asleep, breathes the fumes of ether till the operation is over, and never knows the difference. Then he is given pure oxygen till the ether has been driven from his lungs. The surgeon has the patient under perfect control. If he sees a sign of collapse, the anesthetic is cut off and oxygen substituted until the patient rallies. The use of oxygen after the operation restores him to his normal condition. The patient comes to himself pink and warm, instead of blue and cold. This application of concentrated oxygen following ether or chloroform brings the patient out of his sleep free from the dreadful nausea so long the bane of surgery. Dr. Pyle won an international reputation twenty years ago by devising a safe method of operating for the removal of the prostate gland. One of Tallest Officers.

GOWER STREET CHURCH

The Rev. Doctor Rodgers Begins His Pastorate.

Yesterday, July the 23rd, was a high day in the churches of St. John's, and certainly we all ought to be the better of its functions. At the Roman Catholic Cathedral His Excellency Monignor Stagni officiated in the presence of thousands of devoted people; at Wesley Church the Rev. F. R. Matthews began his pastorate duties, and at Gower Street Church the Rev. Dr. Rodgers commenced his ministry. Not often is it that such events occur at the same time, and therefore we say that we all ought to be the better of such a high day in ecclesiastical circles. To the majority of those who worship at "Old Gower" the Rev. Jabez Rodgers is a stranger; and yet he is not a stranger in the true sense of the word, for he is not one of ourselves? Yes, verily, a son of Terra Nova. Therefore in beginning his ministry yesterday there seemed to form a link that almost bordered on the confines of destiny. For forty years the Rev. Doctor has been a faithful minister of the church of his fathers, and during all that period of time has labored in the Lower Provinces. In all his circuits he has shown himself a workman that needeth not to be ashamed; hence his ministry has been marked by success. His good name was a fragrance among his more immediate co-workers, and though he labored among others, the influence of his toil was not unmet among his own people here in his own country, where his name was held dear and his ability as a preacher well known. Thus it was that the officials of "Old Gower"—the mother of Methodism in Newfoundland—extended to him a call to become its pastor, and thus it was that he accepted the invitation and undertook the duties of the office. Yesterday he began his work, and did so in such a manner and with such a spirit as at once revealed the gentleman as well as the Christian. His is indeed a master workman, and one that any congregation may proudly look up to. We feel the church richer for his services, and also feel that his native city will be richer for his ministry and for his return. In taking up the office of the ministry at Gower Street Church he is following in the steps of many good and able men, and in the memories and zeal of our forefathers. In this spirit we bid him welcome. We welcome him as a countryman, we welcome him as a Christian minister. We welcome him as a good man; and we feel certain that to him and his wife and respected daughter, the warm and generous heart of St. John's will also say welcome.

Rockville, Conn., July 18.—Arthur H. Ramage of Hartford, 25 years old, was killed by an electric shock as he stood at a telephone early to-day in the local sub-station of the Connecticut company through which high-power wires run. It is supposed that the wires became crossed with those of the telephone so that when the young man answered the bell he received the heavy current. Charles Lerner, a trolley conductor, who went to his assistance, received a shock which threw him across the room, but from which he suffered no serious harm.

Yacht Arrives Here.

At 4.30 p.m. Saturday the yacht Sir Hugh Allan arrived here after a run of 9 days from Queenstown, Ireland, and after taking in a supply of bunkers coal left for Montreal at 10.30 p.m. Saturday. The ship was visited by large numbers of people Saturday afternoon and night as she lay at A. J. Harvey & Co's premises. She was built for the Commissioners of the Harbour of Montreal by Vickers Sons & Maxim in the order of the Canadian Government and was launched last February. She can do 15 knots and proved herself to be a fine sea boat on the run across the Atlantic. She is lit with electricity, and is 125 feet long, 27 ft. beam and 12 ft. deep. Capt. English brought her out to be delivered to her owners.
