Opal is Now Stone in Vogue.

London, August 11.—The real opal, which has long been out of favor with the fair sex, is going to enjoy a great vogue this fall. There has always been a superstitious prejudice against these stones, but the new fashion of long necklaces of uncut opals has proved too much for the women to resist, and the jewellers of Bond street and Rue de la Paix are hard put to get a sufficient stock.

Queen Victoria presented to each of her daughters on her marriage a magnificent set of opal ornaments, but these have seldom seen the light of day. One night at the Opera, however, it was observed that Princess Henry of Battenberg was wearing hers, and no doubt Princess Louise and Princess Christian will follow her example.

The Queen of Spain has always worn these stones, for her birthday is in October, the lucky month for opals, and Lady Deverbury and Lady Alton Vivian are similarly fortunate—the latter indeed wore them on her wedding day.

Lady de Bathe (Lady Langtry) has some fine stones, but probably the most valuable opals in England belong to Countess Benicci, who has a tire, necklace, brooches, and earrings, which were collected at much below their value by Lord Beauchamp when he was Governor of Australia.

Others who have worn opals lately are the Dowager Lady Sigo and Lady Norah Brassey.

The Princess Royal has a deep rooted horror of them. Some fine opals were among the jewels she lost when wrecked on the Behn and she declares that their evil influence pursues her to this day.

BERLIN, To-day.
The majority of Berlin newspapers print the Government's decision not to participate in the Panama Pacific Exposition, without comment. The 'Deutsche Tages Zeitung,' the official organ of the Agrarian League, says there are many in Germany who will not be pleased by the over-polite manner in which the Government excused itself from participation in the Exposition. Judging from former experiences, it will not make the desired impression on Americans, either. The 'Tages Rundschau' doubts the wisdom of the decision. The 'Tageblatt' says Germany's abstention from this remarkable opportunity to win new markets and to give the States actual proof of our friendliness, is a serious mistake. German exporters have tremendous interests on both sides of the Pacific.

MATTEWAN, To-day.
Five confederates milled the car in which Thaw escaped, and the big black Limousine which trailed it past the asylum gate. The hospital authorities believe Thaw fled to the shore, Long Island Sound, boarded a yacht waiting with steam up to rush him to Europe. A reward of \$500 for Thaw's apprehension has been offered by Dr. Keib, Superintendent of the Asylum. Howard H. Barnum, attendant at the gate, past whom Thaw flashed in his break for freedom, is under arrest. Other arrests are expected to follow the rigid investigation, begun by Dr. Keib. Shagles were drawn in the dormitories. The inmates were getting their second sleep when Thaw left his room in the morning. He was fully dressed. A milkman's cart was rumbling along the road outside, as he walked

through the store room into the outer court or yard of the asylum grounds. Barnum, the sole attendant at the rear gate, was pacing back and forth when Thaw closed the store room door behind him. He apparently did not grasp the significance of Thaw's early rising. A 60 horse power auto followed by a limousine, also black, loafed lazily along the road as the milkman drew near the gate. Thaw standing a few feet away apparently unconcerned waiting till Barnum unlocked the gate and swung it wide to let the milkman enter; at the same moment two cars drew up on the further side of the road opposite the gate. The "towing" car stood still, its engine throbbing. As Barnum stepped aside for the milkman to drive into the grounds, he heard the gravel crunch beneath Thaw's feet. Looking up he saw the madman flash past him with the speed of the wind straight for the waiting car. With a shout Barnum started in pursuit, but a flying leap landed Thaw safe within the car. They were throwing up a cloud of dust before he had gone twenty-five feet. Down the road, away the car sped in a whirling cloud of dust that spread over their trail like a mantle and blotted them from sight.

Poisoning by Meat Extract.

London, Aug. 12.—Liverpool citizens are interested in the case of a traveling salesman who shows every sign of alcoholic poisoning although he is a teetotaler. His illness is ascribed to the excessive drinking of beef tea and other meat extracts, and the physicians believe that this indicates that nitrogenous stimulants have a similar effect to that of alcohol.

Brigade Sunday.

Three hundred people left the city by the excursion train yesterday afternoon to visit the C.L.B. and C.C.C. lads in camp. The inclement weather interfered materially with the outing in every respect. Most of the proposed arrangements made at Topsall and Manuels to receive the town visitors had to be abandoned. However, the garden party in aid of the Parish Church, was held but was not as successful as it otherwise would have been. The weather was fine. The C.C.C. band, during the afternoon, discoursed lively airs. The sacred concert did not come off. Tonight a dance will take place in the British Hall as a finale to the garden party. The Cadet band will play.

B.I.S. Meeting.

The Benevolent Irish Society held its quarterly meeting yesterday. Hon. J. D. Ryan presided. Satisfactory and gratifying reports were shown by the Treasurer, Secretary and Literary and Amusement Committee. A committee was appointed to look after the roll. Great preparations for the Society's annual outing which takes place at Donovan's on the 27th inst. are being made, and promises to be the best yet.

Hurt by Street Car.

A girl named Best, while crossing Water Street near Steer Bros., on Saturday afternoon, was struck by a street car and thrown violently to the ground, but fortunately she escaped with slight bruises. The girl might have been run over and perhaps killed but for the promptness of the motorman in reversing the brakes.

S. A. Meetings.

The College Hall was filled to its utmost capacity yesterday afternoon. Hon. D. Morison presided and after the opening exercises of prayer, conducted by Brigadier Morison and Major Deabrisar, were finished the chairman made a few remarks expressing the pleasure it gave him to be present. Commissioner Rees then spoke, and after introducing the Chief Secretary, Colonel Maidment, who was making his initial visit to St. John's, gave an exhaustive and instructive address on the life of the late General William Booth, founder of the Salvation Army. The address was an able one and of absorbing interest. At the conclusion a vote of thanks, carried by acclamation, was tendered the speaker. Last night another meeting was held and the attendance very large. Colonel Maidment, spoke, exhorting all to decide at once on the Christian life. Commissioner Rees followed with an eloquent address on the words of St. Paul: "I can do all things through Christ."

HONG KONG, To-day.
The Federal General, Lung Chi Kung, who is President Yuan Shi Kai's candidate for Governor of Canton, disembarked from the government gunboat at Hong Kong on Saturday, to take charge of the city. Fighting which is being aided by pirates is proceeding against the government troops, some miles beyond Canton. Guerrillas are prosecuting their warfare principally for the purpose of looting. On one corner of the street in Canton the bodies of sixty persons killed in the fighting Friday, were found, all the men were in uniforms. The Red Cross has been unable to reach the zone of the fighting in Canton, where frightful conditions are reported to exist among the wounded owing to the great heat. Wholesale executions in Canton are taking place daily.
