ALLIES WITHIN THEIR RIGHTS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16. The United States, it was said by high authorities at the State Department to-day, concedes that the En-tente Allies are within their rights, under prevailing international law, in arming merchant ships for defen-sive purposes, no matter what contions exist on the seas, consequent-it is admitted that should the Allies decline to adopt the American suggestion to disarm merchantmen, this government cannot announce its approval of the intention of the Teu-tonic Powers to torpedo without warning after Feb. 29th all armed vessels.


