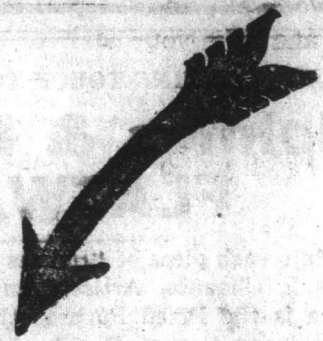

Baseball.

The Baseball Season opens up Wed-
nesday, June 22nd, with two games.
The morning game starts at 10:30
sharp, when the Red Lions, last year's
champions will clash with the B.I.S.
while the afternoon game, the same
day, will be between the Cubs
and C.E.I. There is greater interest than
ever this year in baseball, all the
teams have been strengthened and it
looks like a great fight for the po-
sition and large crowds are looking
forward to the opening day. Mayor
Gosling has been invited to throw
over the first ball for the season, as
is customary in the American and
Canadian cities, while the morning
game will also be held under the su-
perintendence of His Excellency the
Governor and suite. It is regrettable
that the Wanderers' Club will not be
seen in action this season owing to
several of their most prominent
players leaving the country, still,
baseball patrons will be glad to hear
that the Club's name still lives with
the League and are hopeful of enter-
ing the arena again next season.
Four Clubs now comprise the League
viz. Red Lions, Cubs, B.I.S. and
C.E.I. It has been decided that three
rounds of ball will be played, that all
games will be played the full nine
innings, while in the event of dark-
ness setting in at the third round,
seven innings only will terminate the
match. Mr. F. V. Cheaman has again
consented to act as the Umpire in
Chief, while he will be assisted on
the bases by Messrs. T. Y. Hartnett,
P. J. Grace and J. H. Pulmore.
During July month the games will
be played on Tuesday and Thursday
evenings, and August month
all the Mondays are confined to base-
ball, with two other evenings, Thurs-
day the 4th, and Thursday the 18th,
while Wednesday afternoons are also
at the disposal of the League, unless
taken over for some other purpose.

ball patrons to know that the four
teams have been practising faithfully
this past four weeks and are only
too eager to dash into the fray when
play is announced. There is even
greater interest this year than ever
on account of several of our
players being over by scouts
from the Canadian and United States
Leagues. The Baseball League is
also given to understand that the
Manager of the Bridgeport, Connecti-
cut Eastern League Team is sending
on a scout to look over one of our
very promising pitchers, who will be
seen in action on opening day. With
this in view the boys will naturally
be on their toes and furnish the
classiest kind of ball ever witnessed
in the city since the inception. All
the boys want is record attendances,
then everyone will feel glad that the
race is on for the 1921 pennant.

The Sales Tax.

The new Sales Tax which came into
effect on June 13th will need some ex-
planations before it will be readily un-
derstood by the public. It calls for a
tax of 5 per cent on importations for
sale, dutiable or otherwise (except
fishery supplies and raw materials for
manufacture) and is assessable on
costs of goods plus freight, duty and
duty. The amount of the tax is to
be paid to the Customs at the same
time as duties are paid. With the
present surcharges it will tax some
goods 15 to 20 per cent. The tax
is to be computed on the basis of the
goods imported direct, not for sale
but for private use of the importer is
not taxed. The burden of the tax falls
upon the consumer who has to pur-
chase his requirements locally, while
persons with means can import their
own necessities and evade the tax.
This action if followed to any con-
siderable extent would affect all the
good recently arrived at by the Manu-
factures Association, regarding Home
Industries and the labor question and
build up a large mail order business
with Canada and the United States.
