

Small Amount of Coal

SUPPLIES HOUSEHOLD'S DAILY ELECTRICAL NEEDS.

Two handfuls of coal when consumed in one of the large central stations to-day, will produce enough modern householder for one day. ccording to J. F. Johnson, engineer the South Philadelphia Works of the Westinghouse Electric Company, located at Essington, Pa., U.S.A.

"Modern generating equipment has been so improved, chiefly in the matonly about one pound of coal need be burned to produce one kilowatt of electricity," said Mr. Johnson. "Thus, two handfuls, or about two pounds. of coal will produce two kilowatts, slightly more than the daily requirement for a seven or eight room mod-

"This clearly demonstrates the inreased efficiency of the modern steam urbine and also shows the attitude of the manufacturers of electrical enerating equipment toward the ul-

"The modern engineer is chiefly concerned in producing equipment by means of which the greatest number of kilowatts of electricity may be produced from a given unit of coal. It is in cutting down the amount of coal required to produce the kilowatt of lectricity that the engineer regards s his reward of valor."
