After the closing of the mails 5.3 p.m. Saturday, a very pleasing event ceurred at the Assorting room of the General Post Office, when the officials ed and presented Hon. W. J. Woodford, M.H.A., Minister of the Department, with an address of appreciation and a magnificent silver placque en graved as follows:-

Presented to Hon. W. J. Woodford, M.H.A., Minister of Posts and Telegraphs Officials of the Postal Departmen

General Post Office,

Christmas 1925. Every official of the various Departnents was delighted to be present and witness the occasion, and pleasure and enthusiasm were manifested as was clearly an evidence of the good spirit and pleasant relations that exist throughout the Department, particularly on the part of the officials towards the Minister. Before reading the address, Mr. Hod der, the Deputy Minister, said it was his extreme pleasure to represent the gathering and be the spokesman. He paid a glowing tribute to the Minister The address read as follows:-

ADDRESS To Hon. W. J. Woodford, M.H.A., Min ister of Posts and Telegraphs, St. John's Newfoundland.

Dear Mr. Woodford:

We, the officials of the Postal Department of the General Post Office of St. John's Newfoundland, take this opportunity to extend to you the Greetings of the Festive Season and also to ask you to accept the accompanying gift, which, as worded, is merely a slight token of our esteem and admiration for your good self and the office which you hold.

After a period of almost two years under your supervision and direction, we cannot but express our deep appreciation of the very many acts of kindness and courtesies extended to as, officially and otherwise ,and we likewise sincerely hope that your term with us in the future will be equally as successful and congenial as it has administration.

In asking you to accept this piece of silver and our good wishes, it is also our desire to convey to Mrs. Woodford the Compliments of the Season, and hope that you both may live to enjoy many more.

We are honoured, Sir, in subscrib ing ourselves on behalf of the various Departments-(Sgd.)-J. G. Hodder, Deputy Minister of Posts and Telegraphs, W. Campbell, Asst. Deputy, G. At the conclusion of the reading of address, the gathering applauded

vigorously. The Hon. Mr. Woodford in reply was deeply touched by the remarks of the Deputy and the expression of good will which manifested itself and as he himself stated, he could hardly find words to show the assemblage how much he appreciated the gift and the spirit which prompted the officials to offer him also the address, which in itself would live with him for all time and cause him to ever remember the good feeling that existed throughout the Department so much so that he was determined more than ever to do all he possibly could to espouse their cause and endeavor at all times, particularly during his administration of the Department, to avail of every opportunity to advance their work and welfare. He was deeply impressed with the kind thoughts and wishes of the officials and thanked them sincerely, as it was the first time during his public career that he was greeted thus.
