The Manitoba Elections.

As will be seen by the telegraph dispatch in another column, there have been serious disturbances at one of the polling places in that Province. The notorious Riel was the cause of the trouble. He was not satisfied with resigning in favor of Cartier, but in order to show his devotion to the Government at Ottawa, he came out strong for Mr. Cunningham, who was running for Marquette, and why, by the way, was formerly connected with the Globe and Telegraph. Cunningham wa running as a Government supporter, and Riel was giving him all the assistance he could. According to the telegraph, some Canadians, indignant at the course this murderer was taking, and at the impunity wth which he is allowed by the authorities there to meddle with public affairs, got together in a body to prevent him from voting. The Canadians banded es together on one side, and the half-breeds on the other, and a row occurred. Shots were exchanged and a number of men were badly beaten. Special constables were en

beaten. Special constables were enrolled, and great excitement prevailed. Two or three of the newspaper offices were gutted by the mob.

The above are all the details yet received. Full particulars will be anxiously and impatiently looked for. It is quite evident, however, from the above, that the troubles in Manitoba are not yet at an end, and so long as Riel is allowed to go at large, and is petted by the Government or their tools, there will be no lasting peace or contentment in the Province.

The Provincial Exhibition. The Provincial Exhibition opens to day with every prospect of success. The aggregate number of entries this year are some 1,200 more than they were last year. In not a few classe particularly those of agricultural implements and machines, and in grains and seeds, there has been a considerable falling off. There is an immense increase in the entries of horticultural productions, which might reasonably be expected, when we consider that Hamilton and the section surrounding have long been

section surrounding have long been noted for the quantity and superiority of their horticultural productions. In the classes, too, of arts and manufactures there is quite a large increase in the entries.

From all accounts, we have little doubt the forthcoming Exhibition will be a most interesting one. Immense crowds of people from all parts of the Province will visit it. We hope that the weather will be all that the sight seers could wish.

It is said that the grimaces he makes in front of the looking glass are positively appalling.

thoroughly ruined by the heavy con test which he had to sustain, and ha threatened to go into the Opposition unless he receives the Clerkship of the Commons, and that he has been promised it; that Cauchon will take the place of Cartier, who is not expected to live, and will run for Levis, being unwilling to try the chances of another election in Quebec Centre; and that Langevin will retire from the Ottawa Ministry to become Premier of Quebec, Chauveau being


