Tavern and Shop Licenses. Hon Mr Crooks has introduced a Bill into the Ontario Assembly, for the purpose of amending the Act respecting Tavern and Shop Licenses The Bill has had its first and second reading, and will very likely become

The Bill provides that no person shall keep spiritous liquors for sale without being duly licensed, except brewers and distillers, and chemists or druggists duly registered as such,

The following is the most important clause in the Bill, and one which can not meet with the approbation of Temperance men. Instead of limiting the number of places where liquor is sold, the Bill gives shop-keepers the power to sell in quantities less than a quart, thus increasing the number of houses of retail. The clause reads thus:-

The Council of every city, township, town and incorporated village, and the commissioners of police in cities, may by by-law authorize the granting of certificates to obtain licenses for the sale of spiritous, fermented or other manufactured liquors, in quantities less than one quart in any one shop or place, other than a tavern, inn, ale house beerhouse, or house of entertainment at
