Arthur E. Sweatman Threw Himself Before a Train.

The Terrible Deed Took Place at the Entrance to High Park, Toronto, and Was Evidently Premeditated For He Wrote: "May God Forgive Me"-Had Been in Ill Health and Returned Frem California Only Last Week

Toronto, May 6.-Arthur E. Sweat man, eldest son of Eishop Sweat-man, threw himself in front of Grand Trunk train No. 24 at the western entrance to High Park at 12.15 o'clock yesterday, and was instantly killed. The train had stopped at Swanssa and had just started again when Sweatman, who was on the north side of the track, threw his coat and ran directly in front of

Neither Engineer Heron or Fireman Neither Engineer heron of Fileman Burns saw Sweatman until it was too late, and he was run down. The train was stopped, and Conductor Myers had the badly mutilated re-mains brought to the Union Station. Near the scene of the fatality ceased's coat was picked up, and, pinned inside, was an envelope ad-dressed "A. Sweatman, 86 Howland avenue," and containing a pamphlet from the Central Y.M.C.A. Written in pencil in one corner were the words: "May God forgive me," and "Phone N. 1,285" was interlined

with the address.

Deceased was 33 years of age and unmarried. He was a civil engineer and was well known in military cir-cles. He was appointed a lieutenant cles. He was appointed a lieutenant in the Royal Grenadiers on April 24 1891, and became captain in May 1894. Three years later he retired The dead man only returned from California the latter part of last week. He went there to recruit health and suffered a severe attack of typhoid fever. He was visited there by his mother. He was engaged for some time on the Panama Canal. No cause is assigned for the suicide oth-

er than his poor health.

He had been at the Union Station

Conference Between United Mine Workers and Coal Operators.

New York, N.Y., May 5.—President John Mitchell of the United Mine Workers of America made the following announcement Saturday night regarding the secret conference between his organization and the coal operators.

The sub-committee of operators and miners, selected by the Industri-al Branch of the National Civic Fed-eration, failed to reach an agreement upon any of the important issue embodied in the miners' scale, adopt

ed by the Shamokin Convention."
The Executive Committee of the three anthracite coal districts of the United Mine Workers of America, in whom is vested the authority to in augurate a strike, have been notified to assemble at Scranton, Pa., at 10 o'clock a.m., Wednesday, May 7. This committee consists of 28 members appointed from the three districts, and, should a majority of them vote in favor of a strike, the entire 147,000 mine workers will **im**-mediately respond to the call.

TORNADO KILLS 416.

People Carried Up Into the Indian Air

Calcutta, May 1.-A tornado levastated the city of Dacca and adjoining towns. Four hundred and sixteen persons were killed. Crops were ruined throughout the district. Dacca, a city in Bengal, is 150 miles northeast of Calcutta.

Carried People Into the Air. Simia, India, May 2.—The tornado

first struck Posgola the afternoon of April 23, where it wrecked the Datta Jute Works. From Posgola it mov-ed to Sanachar, where the India General Company's warehouses were destroyed by a great wave, which was whirled out of the river by the wind. Everywhere in the path of the cyclone huts, trees, the roofs of houses and people were carried up into the air like paper. Thirty-one persons were killed at Sanachar, 110 were killed near Dacca, 175 were killed at Nagalband, while 130 were killed at Barnighat.

Montreal, Que., May 5.—A special from St. John's, Nfid., says: The uestion of confederation has again ocen projected into the very front of our politics. It always lies just below the surface, and the least disturbance suffices to bring it into full view again. The present revival of interest in it is due to a report that during the coronation festivi-ties, Premiers Laurier and Bond will discuss the matter, and possibly reach an understanding. There will an important conference between the Premiers of Canada and Australia on the subject of trade relations and Sir Robert Bond has been invited to join in this. It is not unreasonable, therefore, to conclude that the subject of union will come up for discussion between himself (Sir Robert Bond) and Sir Wilfrid Laur ier, and that a basis of action may be arrived at.
