The News Condensed and Interpreted for Busy People.

The Salisbury Government Drops the Irish Land and the Tithe Bills.

Financial Panic at Buenos Ayres—Soldiers at Bracero, Ont.

FOREIGN.

The reports of the illness of the Pope are greatly exaggerated.

The panic at Buenos Ayres is subsiding. Gold is at 22 premium. Paper is not accepted.

It is stated that Gen. Boulanger has asked the French Government to grant him a pardon.

The panic at Buenos Ayres is increasing. Gold is at 220 premium. The runs on banks continue.

Advices from Shanghai state that incredible cruelties have been practiced on Chinese soldiers in Formosa.

The Salisbury Government proposes an autumn session of Parliament, to which the Opposition strenuously objects.

The bill providing for the cessation of Hostilities to Germany was read a second time in the House of Lords last night.

A St. Petersburg dispatch says: "Two hundred and fifty houses have been burned at Maidan. Six lives were lost."

An English syndicate has secured a monopoly of supplying the Belgrade market with pork, hams, lard and other hog products.

By a vote of 220 to 181 the French Chamber of Deputies to-day decided to postpone the debate on the Anglo-German agreement for a month.

At Leipzig the woman Rheinhold, who confessed that she was implicated in an anarchist plot, was sentenced to six years' imprisonment. The men were released.

A Shanghai dispatch says that one-fifth of the city of Kirin has been burned; loss, \$5,000,000. There is great suffering; lack of food in Tokio and the interior of the country.

The Salisbury Government has decided to drop the Irish Land Purchase Bill and the Tithe Bill, but will endeavor to pass the bill regarding Heligoland, the Local Taxation Bill, the bill providing for the housing of the working classes and the Census Bill. The proposition regarding continuing bills from one session to another goes over.

CANADIAN.

Charles Barillier, treasurer of the town of Windsor, died yesterday.

A boy named Ernest Girouard was killed at a Montreal railway crossing yesterday.

The annual International Bachelors' Convention has opened at Niagara-on-the-Lake.

Mrs. Hugh Morrow, of Draper township, suicided yesterday at Bracebridge by drowning.

Halifax and Bermuda newspapers exchanged congratulatory messages over the new cable service.

The Allan steamer Blenheim Ayres, in port at Montreal, from Glasgow, brought over 200 Icelandic immigrants for Southern Manitoba.

Rev. Dr. Jenkins, ex-Presbyterian minister, who has been residing in England for some years, is visiting Montreal. He is in good health.

Mr. Fred. White has been instructed to inquire into the charges made by Mr. Davin against Commissioner Herchmer, of the Mounted Police.

The Dominion Government has decided to grant a petition of right to the Quebec corporation and private parties to sue for damages arising from the landslide last fall.

Alexander Jacques, the "Old Man," was buried on Wednesday, at Ottawa, in Beechwood Cemetery. The pall-bearers were eight postmasters of Builders' Lodge, No. 177, A. F. and A. M.

The Dominion Government will shortly send out survey parties to obtain data regarding the cost of deepening Collingwood harbor and removing the obstructions in the ship channel between Lake St. Clair and Lake Huron.

A girl recently arrived from England was brutally assaulted by several cavalry soldiers of Quebec. The girl was found senseless in a stable belonging to the cavalry school. Her body was covered with wounds inflicted on her by the soldiers' spurs.

AMERICAN.

The U. S. Senate has adopted the conference report on the Silver Bill.

One million dollars of gold was ordered at New York yesterday for export.

Five barns and four dwellings in West Troy, N. Y., were burned yesterday. Loss, \$15,000.

The July crop report of the Department of Agriculture at Washington shows a slight decrease in the average condition of wheat.

The Louisiana House of Representatives concurred with the Senate in declaring that Governor Nichols had no power to veto the Lottery Bill.

At Chicago, Wm. Rittamel shot his wife in the head. His son, aged 30, in defending his mother, shot his father. Husband and wife will probably die.

According to the statistical report for June of the Department of Agriculture the average condition of the cotton crop has advanced from 88.8 to 91.4 since previous returns.

Quebec's Shipping Trade.

QUEBEC, July 11.—Since the opening of navigation 198 sailing vessels have arrived here from sea, an increase of 33 over the corresponding date last year. There was an increase of 21 in arrivals of steamships, which to date number 147. An increase of 19 steam and sail from the lower Provinces is reported, 131 having arrived to date.

Butchered by a Woman.

DEVIL'S LAKE, N. D., July 11.—A Mrs. Baldwin, a notorious character, murdered John Kinney at her home across the bay and chopped his body about to pieces. She confessed that she knocked Kinney down and killed him and then proceeded to cut him up. She cut off his head and legs and thrust the body in a gully sack. The murders and a companion are in jail.

Shot Himself with Two Revolvers.

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 11.—Chief of Police Albert W. Webb shot himself through the head last evening inflicting a fatal wound. He had forged the name of a friend to two notes for \$375 and the crime had been discovered.

He had arranged to make good the money, but instead of doing this he went to his office, took from his desk two revolvers, walked up stairs to the police court room, deliberately placed a weapon at each ear and fired them simultaneously. RUN OVER.

A Hamilton boy killed by a Street Car—Three Ladies Killed at Birmingham.

HAMILTON, July 10.—Alfred Hannaford, the 16-year-old son of Mr. Alfred Hannaford, was killed by a street car on Monday night, passing the car on the Hamilton and Dundas Street Railway at noon-day, missed the step and was run over by the cars and instantly killed. The boy was one of the Sunday school scholars of the James Street Baptist Church, and was on his way to a picnic at Ainslie Wood when the accident occurred. No blame is attached to any one, and no inquest will be held.

BIRMINGHAM, N. Y., July 10.—A special train on the Southern Central Road carrying Superintendent Titus, struck a carload of cattle, containing five head, and crossing two miles north of Oswego about 6 o'clock this evening. Three of the women—Mrs. O. Cleveland, widow of ex-Sheriff Cleveland, of Oswego; Mrs. James Shay and Mrs. A. Whittemore—were instantly killed. They were thrown 50 feet from the cars by the force of the collision. The bodies of the three women were caught on a pile of the locomotive and carried some distance. They were badly injured, but it is thought they will recover.

The dead bodies of the boy and man were taken up this morning.

Escape of a Desperate Criminal.

WATERLOO, N. Y., July 10.—Archibald McDonald, who has committed many burglaries in St. Lawrence county, and who is wanted in Canada for making, has recently been confined in the Canton jail, awaiting trial for burglary, and was so desperate that he was compelled to wear a ball and chain. Yesterday he obtained a piece of file, freed himself from the ankle, and when the guard went to lock the cells last night, McDonald seized him, thrust him into a cell and locked him up. Then the prisoner escaped and has not been recaptured.

A Sowers' Battle.

CHICAGO, July 11.—A big fight is on among the brewers of the city. It lies between the English syndicate, which has bought up the largest breweries, and a number of American brewers who have not been taken into the combination. The result of the fight was a drop in the whole sale price of beer from \$6 a barrel to \$5, but the West Side Brewery, a concern outside the combination, has reduced the price to \$3.50 a barrel. It is believed the war will go on until beer will be sold at less than \$2 a barrel.

Cargo Inspection.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—Three veterinary inspectors are to examine all American cattle landed at Great Britain. They will be stationed at Liverpool, one at London and one at Glasgow. They will be at the expense of the Secretary of State, and the restrictions of the British Government upon the importation of beef cattle from this country on the plea of contagious cattle disease, has been on a long and unjustifiable. He proposes to prove to the British authorities that no disease exists in this country to warrant these restrictions.

A large number of Conservatives are willing to sign a memorial asking Mr. St. John to resign. It is expected that Mr. Smith will resign to the request.

Turkish Atrocities.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 11.—Advices received here say a number of Armenian peasants at Adana who failed to pay their taxes were burned alive by Turkish troops.

The authorities of Trebizond have sent 26,000 cases of paraffine to Derum for the purpose of firing an extensive and dense forest, which is likely to serve as a refuge for Armenians if pursued by Turkish troops.

The school at Erzurum, which was the scene of the recent disorders, has been reopened. It has been a political hotbed.

The Rumored Cabinet Changes.

LONDON, July 11.—The rumors that Mr. W. H. Smith is to be transferred to the House of Lords almost immediately, the Lord Randolph Churchill is to take his place as leader of the House of Commons, and that other changes in the Ministry are imminent, are all absolutely devoid of foundation, and that no such reconstruction as that referred to is even contemplated. It is also untrue that Lord Hartington has attended a meeting of the Cabinet Council this morning.

Affairs are becoming more quiet among the letter-carriers and they are performing their duties as usual to-day.

Mrs. Isaac Oldham, wife of a prominent farmer, was killed by a collision Thursday at Livermore Falls, Me.

Mr. Guay is to locate the proposed inter-provincial bridge at the Long Sault, near Lake Temiscamingue.

Adelbert M. Dewey has been elected high chief ruler of the High Temple of the Order of Rechabites of the United States.

Mrs. Arundel, wife of Ex-Senator Arundel, of West Virginia, shot herself through the head Wednesday night, dying instantly.

While the fleet accompanying Emperor William was entering Christiania a gun on board the Friedrich der Grosse exploded prematurely, terribly injuring five of the crew.

At Cincinnati, Ohio, on Thursday, the Globe was destroyed by fire. The editorial was in flames, and was soon in ruins together with its magnificent organ. The panic now became general. Women and children were screaming and running hither and thither and furniture was being thrown out of the windows into the streets, until they became almost impassable. At the last moment, when it was too late, the fire was extinguished.

A gas generator exploded at 119 East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, New York, this (Friday) morning, instantly killing Christie Ackert, the foreman, and badly injuring two of his sons.

The Seventh Day Adventists continue to work on Sunday at Thompson Island Park, Waterford & Co., burned down. Loss on tobacco stored there, \$125,000; on building, \$10,000.

Samuel T. Lynch, postmaster and general merchant at Centerville, Sullivan county, N. Y., is missing, and is accused of forgeries and embezzlement aggregating \$20,000 or more.

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
