Learoyd, of Windsor, delivered the addresses. By a rising vote the two young men were received into full connection with the ministry.

Connectional fund as follows: Union church relief \$373 42, increase, \$6 61; contingent fund \$1,066 04, increase, \$53 08; educational fund, \$1,904 53; Sunday school aid fund, \$246 06; increase, \$13; General Conference fund, \$646 52; increase, \$50 92; missionary fund, \$16, 845 65; women's missionary, \$1,100 68; increase, \$487 58; ministerial support, \$78, 218; total amount raised for all purposes, \$101,792 66. A resolution was passed at the suggestion of the committee asking for a less complicated schedule.

At the afternoon session Rev. James Gray, treasurer of the General Conference fund, presented the report. It shows the fund to be in a very crippled condition. The amount raised was only \$16,363, showing a deficiency of \$10,733. The delegates to the General Conference have had their expenses in part from this fund, but the coulook is anything but encouraging for the coming time. Mr. Gray also read the yearly report of the superannuation fund. All expenses have been paid and the claims fully met. The capital has increased to \$174,648 26 by \$6,352 59. Montreal:

That whereas the constitution of this Dominion knows nothing of the union of Church and State, and recognizes all sections of the church as standing on the ground of perfect equality; whereas in the table of precedence we have the following order: The Governor-General, Lieutenant-Governors, archbishops and bishops, members of the Cabinet, etc., etc., thus ignoring the very existence of the great Protestant churches which represent the majority of the Dominion: whereas, in this order of precedence pre-eminence is given to archbishops, the appointees of the Primate of Rome, to the official degradation of the clergy of the Church of the Montreal Methodist Conference, hereby utter our decided protest against the aforessid order of precedence, and declare our purpose to employ all legitimate means to secure its abrogation, in view of the prominence it bestows upon the hierarchy of the Church of Rome, thus creating invidious distinction between the religious bodies, to the doisdwantage of the Protestant majority of the Dominion.
