The Murtagh assault case, which took place on March 7, came up for final disposal at the Police Court yesterday. Bridget Murray, a boarder at Pat Murtagh's house, testified to seeing the prisoner hit his wife in the head with a plate of beginned afterwards punch her and catch her by the hair. She ran for a policeman, and on returning found them both covered with blood. P. C. Egelton corroborated the latter part of this evidence. Realty is entered at \$1,735,397, and the total value of realty, personal and taxable income amounts to \$1,978,242—an increase of about \$100,000 over last year. The fourth ward is credited with a gain of 142 in population, the total being 6,197, of which 374 are jurors and 63 non-resident. The children between the ages of 5 and 21 number 2,086, while 879 are between the ages of 7 and 13. The value of realty is entered at \$2,129,645, and the total realty, personal and taxable income, at \$2,202,295—an increase of about \$50,000 over the assessment of the previous year.
