BLACK BASS FISHING.

The opening season for black bass fishing begins on Monday, June 17. The act reads that the close season is from May 10 to June 15, both days inclusive, and that bass shall not be taken by other means than angling by hook and line. According to the Ontario act, black bass shall not be taken of less length than ten inches.

LOCAL C. E. OFFICERS. The executive committee of the Local Union of Christian Endeavor held their annual business meeting in St. Andrew's Church last evening. The chief item of business was the electing of officers, as follows: President, Mr. A. Mc-Mullen; first vice-president, Mr. A. Richards; second vice-president, Miss Lamb; third vice-presidnt, Miss Baxter; recording secretary, Miss Drew; corresponding secretary, Mr. McCorkindale; treasurer, Miss Gower. A subommittee was appointed to arrange for the annual picnic. The date will be about the second week in July. The matter of publishing a paper in connection with the society was laid over. SATURDAY EARLY CLOSING.

The Trades and Labor Council held their regular meeting last evening at 8:30 in the usual place of assembly with President Cummings in the chair After routine business had been disposed of a delegation representing the Ministerial Association, the Christian Endeavor Society and other organiza-tions favorable to the early closing of ousiness places on Saturday evening was introduced to the council. Among the delegates who addressed the meeting and urged the co-operation of the Trades and Labor Council in this matter were Mr. R. A. Jones, of London West, Rev. M. P. Talling, and Mr. Thos. Brenton. It was argued in this connection that the preferable day for the payment of wages was Friday or Monday, instead of Saturday. Where Saturday is the payday purchases are ne-cessarily made late in the evening generally long after supper time, and this keeps the parties who deliver the gccds working up till midnight and, often until 2 o'clock Sunday morning. Late hours were in this way not only an injustice to the workers, but a deterent to the proper observance of the Sabbath. These views were warmly in-gersed by the members of the council. Messrs. Joseph T. Marks, H. B. Keene. and others, spoke on the subject, expressing themselves as heartily in accord with the movement, and anxious to lend their aid or accept the aid of others in accomplishing the object aimed at. The early closing of stores on Saturday as well as other evenings it was held would be in the interest of the manufacturer and merchant as well as the workingman. A large meeting is to be held in the near future, when the various societies interested in this reform will be represented by delegates, and a united effort made to bring the matter in a clear and forcible way befcre the attention of the public.
