### BRITISH CABINET **DELIBERATIONS**

Surmises as to What the Ministers Did-Nothing Positive Known.

London, Sept. 22.-Late in the day various rumors were still current regarding the cabinet meeting, but the following, which the Pall Mall Gazette publishes, is believed to be correct.

"The comparatively short duration of the council warrants the conclusion that nothing of supreme importance was decided at it, and such we believe to be the fact.

"Information in our posession is to the effect that it was an interim cabinet, summoned to consider an interim dispatch. It is believed that this dispatch, which met with the unanimous approval of Mr. Chamberlain's colleagues, will be published as soon as received by the Boer Government, on

Monday, or, at the latest, on Tuesday."

According to the Pall Mall Gazette, the dispatch opens with an expression of regret at the unfavorable character of Secretary Reitz's last reply, and proceeds with a very firm insistence upon the repudiation of the claim of the Transvaal to the status of a foreign state, once more pointing out British readiness to settle at once the nature of the proposed arbitration tribunal, pro-vided the other British conditions are promptly and unreservedly accepted, concluding with the intimation that the imperial government is now engaged in drawing up its own terms, and that the Transvaal may expect to hear from them very shortly.

other meeting of the cabinet will take place next Thursday or Friday, when the issues will be presented in a more serious shape.
