DEATH OF A FREAK

Wild Man of Borneo Passed Away—
Sold His Body for \$100.

Rochester, N. Y., May 23.—Thomas Kane died at his son's home in Brighton Monday, aged 70 years. A physician of this city claimed the body, saying that he had paid Kane \$100 for his remains two years ago. Kane's death was very sudden, the cause being heart disease.

Kane has been a very interesting study for physicians for a number of years. He suffered from acromegalia, a disease which causes an enlargement of different members. His hands and feet were of extraordinary size. An enterprising amusement manager got hold of Kane and made many dollars out of him. He exhibited him as the "Wild Man of Borneo" at Ontario Beach for two months last summer. He had under a tent in a bed of straw, and had heavy chains fastened to his ankles. At a signal the "wild man" would howl most dismally and clank at the chains. He was also exhibited at Coney Island as "Brutus the brute," and big crowds viewed his immense hands and feet.

The Railways.

Winnipeg, Man., May 23.—A St. Paul dispatch says the Manitoba Government has asked the Northern Pacific Railway Company on what terms it would sell or lease its system in Manitoba. The officials of the company at headquarters were not in a position to discuss the proposition when interviewed. Colin H. Campbell, the member of the Manitoba Government, who was down there, will disclose nothing with regard to his trip, although there is a well-grounded rumor in circulation to the effect that Mr. Campbell's mission was fruitless.

The northern end of the Rutland-Canadian Railroad, from Burlington, Vt., to Rouse's Point, N. Y., is so far completed that freight trains are operating over it. Only parts of the road are being ballasted.

Charles Steele, of J. P. Morgan & Co., New York, who succeeded the late Charles H. Coster, as a director of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, characterized the reported control of that road by the Pennsylvania or any other trunk line as a "yarn." The report was an old one, he added, but absolutely without foundation.
