A white marble tablet has been placed in All Saints Church, Winnipeg, in memory of Major Arnold, who was killed at Passchendaele.

Charles Strangway had all the fingers of his left hand cut off in the Goodison works, Sarnia, on Saturday.

The body of an unknown man, supposed to be that of a laborer or sailor, about 40 years of age, was found in the river at Walkerville on Friday.

J. McNeil, of Hamilton, who was fatally injured some days ago while drinking with a crowd in the north end of the city, died of lockjaw at the hospital.

Hiram Franklin Pierce, better known as "Old Hiram," among the professional gamblers of New York, died elsewhere in New York on Wednesday, aged 72, penniless.

William A. Turnbull, wealthy, and a bridegroom of hardly more than three weeks, was drowned on Sunday while bathing from a yacht anchored off College Point, L. I.

G. Rudolph, an old Nome miner, now in New York, has written the secretary of the treasury at Washington that there are far more destitute people at Nome than is generally known.

While hastening to the bedside of a dying wife, John MacKinnon, Philadelphia, aged 45 years, fell under a train near his home and received injuries which resulted in his death.

Judge Bell, at Chatham, on Saturday, sentenced Rufus Milner to 4 years in Kingston Penitentiary. Milner has been in jail since last April. He was found guilty of having set fire to a building last year.

It is reported from Baler that Americans captured some insurgents, who assert that they witnessed the burial alive of a number of the party of Lieut. J. C. Gilmore, of the Yorktown, captured there by the Filipinos in the spring of last year.

TWENTY-TWO PERISHED.
Valparaiso, Chili, July 16.—Rainstorms in Southern provinces have caused rivers to overflow and inundate villages. The Chilean steamship Lonia, bound for Valparaiso, was wrecked off Taica Lupo. It is believed that 22 of the crew perished, besides the wife and son of the engineer.

TWELVE PICNICKERS HURT.
St. Louis, Mo., July 16.—A car of the Suburban Company's Western Division last night ran into and capsized a wagon loaded with picnickers, returning from Forest Park. Twelve excursionists were hurt, two seriously.

THE MARCH TO PAARDEBERG.

DEATH OF DR. MOWAT

A Distinguished Scholar and Professor at Queen's University and a Brother of the Lieut. Governor of Ontario.

Kingston, July 15.—Rev. John D. Mowat, D. D., professor of Hebrew at Queen's University, died this morning at 5 o'clock. Death was due to exhaustion as a result of a delicate operation performed last Tuesday. He had been a patient sufferer for years.

About the 1st of March the Kingston Presbyterian celebrated the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the ministry. The deceased was born in Kingston in 1825, being one of three brothers, the present lieutenant-governor, Sir Oliver Mowat, being also one of them. In 1845 he graduated in arts from Queen's, and attended Edinburgh University for two sessions. He was called to the pastorate of St. Andrew's Church, Niagara, in 1850, and in 1857 was appointed professor of theology in Queen's. In 1883 he received the degree of D. D. from the University of Glasgow. Dr. Mowat in 1855 married the eldest daughter of the late Rev. Dr. McGill, of Montreal, but she died in 1856. He married again in 1860 the second daughter of the late Hon. John McDonald, of Gananoque. His family consisted of wife, two daughters and two sons, the latter being Mr. Herbert M. Mowat, C. C., Toronto, and Mr. John Mowat, of the law firm of Mudie & Mowat, Kingston. When Dr. Mowat was appointed to Queen's he was a taught Hebrew, Chaldee, church history and Old and New Testament exegesis. The work he then did was latterly done by three professors and himself. Dr. Mowat was a member of Queen's during the regime of every principal of the university. When he was appointed a professor there were only 64 students; now there are 650. Last year he was relieved of his duties and died at his home, the appointment of Rev. Dr. Jordan, of Stratford, who will in all probability succeed the deceased, and take over the full duties hitherto jointly occupied by himself and Dr. Mowat during the past year.
