A Distinguished Scholar and Professor at Queen's University and a Brother of the Lieut. Governor of Ontario.

Kingston, July 15 .- Rev. John D. Mowat, D. D., professor of Hebrew at Queen's University, died this morning at 5 o'clock. Death was due to exhaustion as a result of a delicate operation performed last Tuesday. He had been a patient sufferer for years. Biliousness. Indigestion, Dyspepsia. About the 1st of March the Kingston Constination and All Disorders of the Presbytery celebrated the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the min-istry. The deceased was born in Kingers, the present lieutenant-governor, Sir Oliver Mowat, being also one of them. In 1845 he graduated in arts from Queen's, and attended Edinburgh University for two sessions. He was called to the pastorate of St. Andrew's Church, Niagara, in 1859, and in 1857 was appointed professor of theology in Queen's. In 1883 he received the degree of D. D. from the University of Glasgow. Dr. Mowat in 1855 married the eldest daughter of the late Rev. Dr. McGill, of Montreal, but she died in 1856. He married again in 1860 the second daughter of the late Hon. John McDonald, of Gananoque. His family consists of wife, two daughters and two sons, the latter being Mr. Herbert M. Mowat, Q.C., Toronto, and Mr. John McD. Mowat, of the law firm of Mudie & Mowat, Kingston. When Dr. Mowat was first appointed to Queen's he taught Hebrew, Chaldee, church history and Old and New Testament exegesis. The work he then did was latterly done by three professors and himself. Dr. Mowat was connected with Queen's during the regime of every principal of the university. When he was appointed a professor there were only 64 students; now there are 650. Last year he was relieved of part of his arduous duties by the appointment of Rev. Dr. Jordan, of Strathroy, who will in all probability succeed the deceased, and take over the full duties hitherto jointly occupied by himself and Dr. Mowat during the past year.
