MANY WERE KILLED. In the storm which passed over this section this afternoon four persons were killed in Queensborough and two others stand very little chance of recovering from injuries received. Thos. Dunn, of Flushing, L. I., 16 years old, took refuge from the rain under a big tree. Lightning struck the tree, and Dunn was instantly killed.

The barn belonging to Frank Valentine, in Flushing, was hit by lightning and set on fire. Valentine rushed into the barn to save his cattle. He was struck by a falling timber and burned

to death. Clarence Weeks, a farm hand, employed by Mr. Valentine, was in the barn before the lightning struck it, and has not been seen since.

Chauncey Lay, 16 years old, was out walking with his father in Corona when the storm came up. A broken electric wire fell across their path, and the boy became entangled in it and was burned to death before he could be extricated. Fanny Byrnes, 17 years old, was badly burned and shocked in alighting

from a trolley car during the storm. The arm of the trolley car broke and fell upon Miss Byrne's shoulder. She tried to push it from her, and was badly burned and shocked.
