Hodgins' statements of April regarding the smallpo, epidemic, I feel it my duty to Dr. Mc-Neill, medical health officer for London township, to make the following statement: Mr. Hugh Morkin, hay presser, came to my house and prevailed on me to allow my son Edmund to go with the hay press for a few to go with the hay press for a few days. I consented, and my son went the first half-day to Mr. H. Bilyea's, or con. 14; from there they went to Mr. J. R. Hodgins', arriving there late at night on Feb. 19, it being cold and very stormy. After the horses were stabled Mr. Hodgins invited them into the house, if they were not afraid of chickenpox. My son replied he was not house, if they were not afraid of chickenpox. My son replied he was not afraid of anything, as he was cold, wet and hungry. He slept in one of the beds that had been occupied by Mr. Hodgins' children. After pressing Mr. Hodgins' hay my son came home, having been at no other place with the hay press, and in thirteen days from that press, and in thirteen days from that time he sickened with this disease. time he sickened with this disease. The other five of my family previously having had chickenpox, we joked Edmund, saying: "He escaped it before, when the rest had it; he was in for it now." But the disease did not stop there, for the rest of the family, as well as myself, contracted the disease. as myself, contracted the disease. My eldest daughter went to Clinton, to visit her uncle, on Saturday, March 23, and on Sunday sickened with the disease. Dr. Graham was called in and became alarmed as to the nature of the disease, and subsequently called Dr. Shaw, medical health officer, in consultation and after due consideration protation, and after due consideration pro-nounced it smallpox, and placarded the house. Dr. Bryans, of Toronto, at specialist on smallpox, was called at my request, and confirmed the diagnosis. My son Edmund had not been nosis. My son Edmund had not been away from home, except to Lucan, since Christmas, and that was in January. If Mr. Hodgins considered it chickenpox merely, why all this renovating and housecleaning, as stated in the newspapers, and why were the boys sent the second night to sleep in an sent the second night to sleep in an unoccupied house, where there was neither furniture or clothes? Consideration of the control of the cont ering the loss and inconsenience to myself and family, as well as my bro-ther-in-law in Clinton, not saying anyther-in-law in Clinton, not saying anything about the danger to the people at large, it ill becomes anyone to interfere with the medical health officer in the discharge of his duty. Truly any man who would endanger the lives of his fellow-citizens and regist the automatical data. of his fellow-citizens and resist the authority of the health officers in stamp-ing out this loathsome and dreadful disease is most selfish and cruel, and is not a friend to his fellow-man or deserving of citizenship.
