The Water Commissioners have decided that, after the 1st of July next, no manufacturer or warehouse man shall use the city water for running his tric motors. This is a move in the direction of economizing our water supply, and is to be commended. The public have not been unduly alarmed over the prospects of a water famine, though realizing that such a thing is possible if they become extravagant in

disposal of what they have. If care is taken in the use of city water, so that there shall be less waste of that valuable article, our supply ought to be ample for many years to come. If the railways should draw their water from the river; if the use of hydraulic elevators be prohibited; if all the large establishments are metered, and if the citizens will exercise a little moderation in the quantity of water they spread over their lawns, there should be no lack of water for

A formal challenge was sent and accepted. Schoolfellows readily agreed to act as seconds, believing that the affair was only in fun. When the duelists arrived at the appointed place in a wood armed with real revolvers the seconds became frightened and de-

At any event the men have suffered severely and must be in a critical condition, even if they have not perished, as they had no food, nor could they get any fuel on the reef, which is now nothing

but a mass of ice. Several rescue parties started up shore today, but have not reported yet. Several more will start tomorrow for Whalesback Reef. The searching parties so far have met with no success, not even a sign of sleighs or shanties having been found. Relatives of the missing men held a meeting to consider the best plans to pursue.
