A PARIS BOY ARTIST

Thaddeus Styka, Son of Hungarian Painter, Had Pictures Accepted.

Paris, July 5. — The youngest painter of this year's salons was Thaddeus Styka, a boy of thirteen, son of Jan Styka, a Hungarian, who is likewise a painter.

Two of his pictures were accepted— a portrait of his father, and one of himself.

Thaddeus took to drawing at a very early age, as naturally as Mozart did to music. When he was in the Catholic school in Paris, in the Rue de Valenciennes, he used to fill his sketch-book every week with drawings, and show them to his father when the latter went to see him. His father even utilized the thought embodied in some of these drawings for his own painting.

The tones of the flesh of the young painter, and his methods of depicting light resemble those of the painter, Henner. The latter is very fond of the young artist. He has a studio in the same building as the Stykas at No. 11, rue Pigalle. Father and son have the studio where Puyvis de Chavannes once worked.

Thaddeus is pale, with straight hair, not very large, and thin in manner, a contrast to his father, who is tall, well built and exuberant in his manner. The boy wears at his work a suit of chestnut-colored corduroys, with knee breeches. When painting he is so occupied he thinks of nothing else, and is barely conscious of the people around him.

Three years ago he took up sculpture, just as he did painting, without any lessons. His sculptures already show much talent and astonishing energy.

He has one friend that pertains to childhood—his cat, Rigolo. When his work is done he romps with his feline companion boisterously, like any other child of thirteen.

KILLED GRIZZLY

WITH A SHOTGUN

Doubly Perilous Experience of Two Poorly-Armed Men in Alaska.

Nome, Alaska, July 5. — A 12-bore shotgun was the weapon carried by F. N. King and a .303 repeating Savage was the armed equipment of his partner, N. P. Peterson, when they went prospecting in Homestake Creek, at the base of the Sawtooth Mountains. The men are proprietors of the Nugget roadhouse across the Nome divide.

After a walk of several miles they sighted bear tracks and a little later came upon a grizzly. Peterson dropped to one knee, took steady aim and fired. The bullet struck, but not in a vital spot, and with a growl of rage and pain the wounded bear gave a spring over the cliffs and rolled almost to the bottom, some three hundred feet below, where he regained his footing and vanished among the rocks. Chagrined at the failure, Peterson turned and was horrified at seeing another grizzly about twice as large as the other, spring upon his partner, Mr. King, and was more horrified when he remembered that his was the only available gun, and as the magazine was out of repair could only be reloaded by removing the empty shell by hand. When the bear sprang at King the latter, with habitual presence of mind inherent in the backwoods hunter, thrust his shotgun into the face of his assailant, which was advancing with open mouth and extended claws.

In the twinkling of an eye the bear had grasped the muzzle of the gun in his teeth and was crunching the gun barrel. Tearing two feet higher than King, the latter realized that the only hope for him was to pull the trigger and maybe stop the bear's thrust. His partner could reload the old rifle, or until they could procure safety by flight. A loud report, a sudden roar and the bear gave a spring in the air and fell to the ground.

The men beat a quick retreat, and after covering a considerable distance, turned, and were surprised to see the bear still lying on the spot where it had fallen. "On the Hunt," the grizzly, in the meantime reloading the rifle, the shotgun being broken at the stock and the muzzle left in the mouth of the bear.

After throwing several rocks from a safe distance they ventured nearer and found the bear still in the same position. The men went back for sleds, and after several hours managed to get the bear to the Nugget roadhouse, and then started for Nome with nine strong dogs to draw the heavy load. It took them three days to reach the Nome roadhouse, and the bear's remains were put in cold storage. The big brute was brought to town on June 3 and placed on exhibition at the Golden Gate Hotel. It is a perfect specimen of the grizzly and the skin in a beautiful one. The bear, dismembered, weighs nearly 600 pounds. The head, sold for \$125 and the meat was purchased by local restaurants at \$1 a pound.

A remarkable thing was the enormous power of the jaws shown by the deep indentations made in the barrel of the gun by the bear's teeth. The barrel being bent, but marks were made in the steel connecting piece about one-fourth of an inch deep.

A CRUSADE ON CONSUMPTION

Charities Organization of New York Scatters Circular of "Don'ts."

New York, July 5. — The Charity Organization Society's committee on the prevention of tuberculosis has, in conjunction with the Central Federated Union's Committee on Sanitation, issued a circular which will be spread broadcast through the city regarding the methods of prevention in the cure of consumption. In speaking of the methods of preventing consumption the circular states that people should not expectorate on the sidewalks. Spitting on floors, or in hallways, or on the floor of the shop, is also condemned. The circular says:

"When you spit, spit into gutters, or into a cup, or into a spittoon. Do not spit half full of water and clean them out at least once a day with hot water." Among other "don'ts" given on the subject are:

Don't cough without holding a handkerchief or your hand over your mouth. Don't live in rooms where there is no fresh air.

Don't sleep in rooms where there is no fresh air, and be sure to keep at least one window of your bedroom open day and night.

Don't eat with soiled hands. Don't neglect a cold or a cough. Don't drink whisky, beer or other intoxicating drinks; they will do you no good, but will make it harder for you to get well.

Don't sleep in the same bed with anyone else, and, if possible, not in the same room. Keep in the sunshine as much as possible.

INTERCOLONIAL HAS A SURPLUS

Mr. Emmerson Makes Statement of Financial Condition of the Road.

Ottawa, July 5. — In the House yesterday the subject of railways and canals was taken up by the committee of supply. A statement of the financial condition of the Intercolonial Railway was made by the Minister of Railways. He said that during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1903, the earnings of the road were \$5,724,323, and the working expenses \$6,196,653, giving a surplus of \$127,670. During the year before that the earnings were \$5,712,385, and the expenses \$5,744,563, respectively. As an explanation of why the working expenses have increased Mr. Emmerson pointed out that the wages of the engineers and firemen have gone up \$26,184 for the same number of men, and that the cost of fuel has risen \$67,678, and other things in proportion. The evening was spent in committee of supply, and several of the items for the department of railways were passed.

DEVIL'S ROCK BLOWN UP

Has Been Cause of the Deaths of 16 Small Trenton Boys.

Trenton, July 5. The fourth of July was ushered in here by the blowing up of Devil's Rock in the Delaware River. In the past seven years sixteen small boys have lost their lives while in swimming at this place. The rock projected twelve feet above the water and had a diameter of 25 feet. A rush of water caused a big hole to be washed out on one side, and into its depth small boys who could not swim would walk. John Kelly, electrician, at the state house, got tired of seeing dead bodies brought out of the hole, and he started a subscription to pay the expense of blowing up the rock. It took him three weeks before he got \$100, which was the cost of the work.

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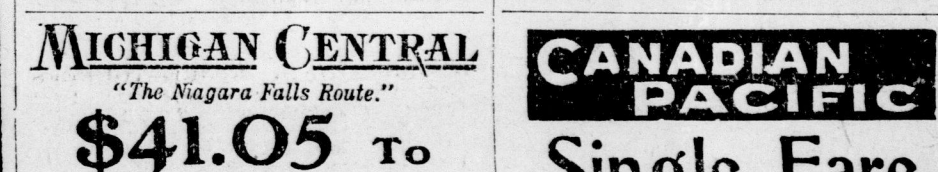
